THEY DESERVE THE BEST

IT WAS PLEASANT to read the report from Ottawa the other day that really effective steps are being taken to find jobs for the men who served Canada in two wars.

It is Twenty-eight years since the First Great War ended and few of these 48,000 two-war men can be much less than fifty.

Last March 12,000 of them were out of work but since then 8,000 had found jobs. The federal government is attempting to place others through the Canadian Corps of Commissioners organized in the thirties, and now comprising 6,000 members.

But the government is only showing the way. It is up to employers to give these men jobs and keep them employed.

Employers seem to have a deep inclination to hire youth for any and every job. In many cases these old veterans turn out a better job than younger men. In so-called dead-end jobs suitable for them, younger men are wasted.

If men more than sixty years of age can drive Canada's locomotives there is no reason why men over forty-five can't be bank messengers, doormen, elevator operators, chauffeurs, guards, porters and store detectives.

Apart from these two-war men there are thousands of veterans of the First Great War who served in war factories and now are facing employment difficulties. Many are "burned-out" and suitable for only light employment.

WHAT ABOUT CHEMURGY? CHEMURGY is a fancy word that was invented in 1933 to designate the science of converting farm products to industrial use.

Actually the practice of chemurgy is quite old. Our pioneer ancestors knew many chemurgy tricks. They made woolen yarn and homespun cloth from sheep's wool.

During the war years farmers were working overtime producing food and they had no worries about markets. But now that the war is over and markets may again become uncertain farmers are asking themselves "What about Chemurgy?"

The industrial use of farm products may run along three main lines: 1. New uses for surplus or low-quality products e.g. alcohol from wheat.

2. Industrial crops to supply existing or new needs e.g. soybeans and sunflowers for vegetable oils.

3. Profitable uses for farm by-products and wastes e.g. cardboard from straw.

Of these three, the second seems to be on the soundest basis. Tobacco, sugar beets, soybeans are all industrial crops that have proved their worth. Others that show promise are sunflowers, fibre flax, and the starch crops — corn, wheat, potatoes.

As far as "surplus" and "waste" products are concerned there are some serious handicaps. Surpluses are irregular and hence an unreliable source of raw material for industry.

Chemurgy does not seem to be the fairy godmother it seemed in depression years. Nevertheless both agriculture and industry will most certainly be the richer for some chemurgic developments.
