### THE CITIZEN OF TOMORROW.

MISS NORA-FRANCES HENDERSON, executive secretary of The Association of Children's Aid Societies of Ontario, Inc., has compiled a booklet entitled "The Citizen of Tomorrow" which should be read by every citizen

of the Province. The material in the booklet sets forth the history of Children's Aid Societies in the United States, England and finally Canada. The first efforts in Ontario to frame a law to protect the Child resulted from the aroused sympathies of a Toronto newspaper reporter in 1891. It is significant to note that the movement was first bound up with an Act for the protection of animals, and an arresting fact that the first response on the part of the Toronto City Council to this dual movement was a drinking trough for The Children came after.

The foundation stone for the operation of the present Children's Aid Societies was the Child's Protection Act introduced in the Ontario Legislature in 1893 by Sir John Gobson. Subsequent amendments and additions over the past half century, has stemmed in vigorous and beautiful growth the whole effort and undertakinggoverned by statute but given its life and spirit communities of people-familiarly known as Children's Aid. From an acorn of individual compassion and pertinacity grew a great Oak tree that shelters the children who have no normal roof-tree of their own.

The society in Haldimand has been operating since 1922 and through the years the work has constantly increased. The post war years will bring added responsibilities to those associating themselves with this vital work. The Society is our community response to the needs of our children-a duty which should be felt by every responsible citizen. The citizens of to day have the responsibility of determining what sort of citizens of tomorrow will be those who come under the protection of the Children's Aid Societies.

## FLOUNDERING-

This floundering so pertinately expressed by Mr. Rawson is evident in our own community, though we can be exceedingly thankful that it exists only in a small degree as compared to the larger municipalities.

The co-operative spirit of comradeship and sacrifice is being forgotten and the old lust of selfishness and greed is taking its place. The moral law and respect for law and order, weakened by the confusion of the war years, among the citizenship, is setting an unprincipaled example to the younger generation. Those who have been too weak to withstand iniquitous temptations may say that what they do is their own business, but they should at least recognize the danger of their example to those whose minds are still in the formative stage. Discharged members of the Armed Services must have a letter from the Department of Veterans Affairs that they have been discharged from the Armed Services and a letter from the company which formerly employed them and is re-employing them, or from a company engaged in a similar business whose services they are now entering. Any company employing a veteran before the war, but which owned and later sold the car he used while in their employ, cannot obtain another car by declaring that it is re-employing the veteran, unless that company qualifies under one of the categories. A thorough investigation is made to determine that the car, which the veteran is asking to be replaced by a new one, was formerly used for business purposes. In the case of large corporations re-employing a number of veterans, application must be made by each veteran individually for a car to take the place of the one he formerly possessed, and sold prior to his enlistment.

A priority certificate expires on the specified date, unless extended by application to the Office which issued it. The holder must place his order with a dealer within ten days of the date of issue, or forfeit, the right to have the date for purchase extended.
