One in fact, did fall quite close, shattering their helmets and making a crater fifty feet across and thirty feet deep.

"There are few places I liked better than Jarvis with the possible exception of Vancouver Island," said Cpl. Alan Cameron in describing his journey to Alaska and to California at the time of the San Francisco Conference. Cpl. On the Farm Front

BRIEF NOTES FOR THE
BUSY FARMER
— By Halldmand Harry —

Halldmand farmers have done it again! For the sixth year in succession Halldmand has led the province of Ontario with the highest per cent of grade A hog carcasses. This is a very important achievement and the feeders of pigs deserve the highest credit for maintaining such a high standard. Congratulations must certainly be in order.

Final figures on marketings show that a total of 19,761 hogs were marketed with 8,467 or 42.9 per cent in top grade. This is an increase of 4.2 per cent over last year. The one disappointment is that the total marketings were 18.3 per cent below the previous year 1944. This is very unfortunate in the light of the over-all food picture.

The next highest county was Welland with 45.9 per cent but this county marketed less than 2,000 hogs. Bruce county, however, has done a magnificent job. The total marketings were 82,799 or 45.1 per cent in top grade. In other words Bruce county had more than twice as many hogs in top grade as Halldmand marketed altogether. This is one county that will present a real challenge to the supremacy of Halldmand.

Twenty counties marketed over 40 per cent A's as compared with 10 in 1944. The top 10 are as follows: Halldmand, 47.9 per cent; Welland, 45.9 per cent; Bruce, 45.1 per cent; Wentworth, 44.6 per cent; Brant, 42.9 per cent; Hamilton, 42.4 per cent; Waterloo, 42.9 per cent; Ontario, 42.8 per cent; Wellington, 41.9 per cent; Peterborough, 41.9 per cent; Victoria, 41.9 per cent; York, 41.9 per cent. The last four tie for tenth position.

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J. B. McKenzie, Well Known Citizen Passes

John B. McKenzie, died at the home of his son, Ivan McKenzie, in the Township of Walpole, on Friday, February 22nd, in his Seventy-ninth year.

The late Mr. McKenzie was born in the County of Middlesex in the year of Confederation, 1867, a son of Robert McKenzie and Elizabeth Bain. His parents moved to the McKenzie homestead where he lived when he was two years of age. Aside from a period after his marriage to the former Lucy Saunders, who died four years ago, when they lived on the farm adjoining the homestead, this was his home until his death. He was a sound citizen and made a real contribution to the community in which he lived in his high regard by his neighbours and took an active part in community life. He was appointed a director of the Walpole Farmers Mutual Fire Insurance Company and in 1918 became President, a post he held until 1939 when he resigned. He continued, however, as a member of the Board until 1942. He also served as Treasurer of the Township of Walpole for a period of fourteen years. He was appointed Treasurer in 1927, succeeding the late S. Winger and continued to serve in that capacity until 1940. He was a member of Knox Presbyterian Church, Jarvis, and served for a number of years as an Elder on the Official Board. In politics he was a staunch Liberal, although he never aspired to office.

The late Mr. McKenzie was remembered by many in his home district as superintendent of the Sunday School that for a number of years was held at the school house in Section 17.

Left to mourn his passing are seven children: Harvey, of Walpole Township; Lorne, of Hagersville; Bruce, North Hill, B.C.; (Fern) Mrs. R. A. Austin, of Woodhouse; (Elva) Mrs. Elmer Schreyer, Walpole; (Helen) Mrs. Charles Fleming, Toronto; and Ivan at home; also ten grandchildren.

The funeral was held on Monday, Feb. 24, at 10 o'clock, from the home of the family and a public service at Knox Presbyterian Church, Jarvis, Rev. W. H. Fuller had charge of the service. Interment was made in the adjoining cemetery.

The pallbearers were: Wesley R. Hodge, Harold Kintree, Wray Craddock, Wm. E. Doughty, Kenneth Saunders and John Auld.

W. G. SCORD, EIGHTY-ONE

W. G. Scord, well known resident of Walpole, died yesterday morning in his Eighty-first year.

Born at Lynedoch in Norfolk County, the late Mr. Scord was for a time with the C.N.R. before taking up farming nearly twenty years ago. For the past thirty years he has resided at his late home in Walpole.

His first wife, the former Lenora, predeceased him in 1920. In 1924 he married again and his wife survived besides five sons and one daughter: George, Detroit; Arthur, New York; Ezra, Marine City, Mich.; Harold, at home; and Shirley, at home.
