Local Elections In Walpole Or Jarvis

Three Month Agricultural Course Opens Next Week

Facilities At Youth Center Provides Real Opportunity For Young County Farmers

The first three months' school in Agriculture and Home Economics is scheduled to open on Tuesday, January 2nd, at the Haldimand Rural Youth and Agricultural Centre. This is the first of a series of activities outlined for this Centre, which was only recently acquired by the Ontario Department of Agriculture. Other activities that are being planned include Farm Forum Meetings, Spring Seed Fair, Farmers' Week, Field Days and Picnics, and Hockey and Softball games. It is anticipated by those in charge, that the Rural People of the County will want to make full use of their new property. The three months' school is under the direction of Mr. A. Gordon Skinner, County Agricultural Representative, as Principal. Mr. J. Edward Shub, the Assistant Agricultural Representative, will be in charge of the instruction in Agriculture and he will be assisted by Mr. A. O. Dalrymple. Miss Helen McKeercher will be in charge of the instruction in Home Economics and she will be assisted by various members of the Women's Institute Branch. Everything possible is being done to make this the finest course of its kind ever offered in the Province. Registration will take place at 10:00 A.M. Tuesday, January 2nd, to be followed by a short opening ceremony at 11:30 o'clock. Classes will commence at 1:00 P.M. on Tuesday. Those who intend to take this course, and have not made application, should do so immediately. All enquiries should be addressed to the Ontario Department of Agriculture, at Cayuga.

Three More Local Men Are Back Home From Overseas

Three more Jarvis men have returned from overseas service within the past week. Pte. Ralph W. Hazlett and Pte. Walter H. Cassidy arrived at New York aboard the Queen Elizabeth last week after a rough crossing and reached their homes here on Saturday night. Pte. David Bradley arrived in Halifax yesterday aboard the Mauretania and is expected to reach Jarvis tomorrow. Pte. Ralph Hazlett enlisted in June 1942 and went overseas in July of the following year. During his overseas experience he served in England, France, Holland and Germany. He was attached to the R.C.A.S.C. Members of his family met him at the Army Trades School in Hamilton on his arrival there at five o'clock Saturday afternoon. Although resident here before enlistment, his wife, the former Genevieve Devine has been employed in Simcoe during his absence. Ralph is looking fine and unlike some of the other boys who have returned he says his civilian clothing which he had before enlisting still fits him perfectly. Walter Cassidy went overseas in June 1942 and went into France with the D-Day invasion forces. He enlisted in June 1940 and has therefore seen more than five and a half years service. He was with the R.C.O.C.'s on enlistment and transferred to the Tank Corps later. He drove tanks right up to the time the Germans said enough on their own territory. Walter said the crossing was a rough one and that he is tired after the trip. Otherwise he is in good health.

TWO MEMBERS IN R.C. COLLEGE OF CARDINALS

Canada now has two members in the Roman Catholic College of Cardinals. Announcement was made by the Vatican Sunday that Archbishop James Charles McGuigan of Toronto has been named a cardinal together with thirty-one others. Archbishop McGuigan declared that his new honor would in no way affect his responsibilities and position as Archbishop. The news came to him as the greatest surprise of his life. "I accept the honor as coming to the Dominion of Canada as a recognition of its enhanced place in the world, and an anticipation of its future growth in power and influence in the councils of Christendom," he said.

Lorne Porter Is New Member Of Walpole Council

The Walpole Township Council for 1946 have obtained their seats by acclamation. At Twelve o'clock noon, yesterday, the last hour in which qualification for nominations could be received, only a sufficient number had qualified to fill the respective seats. Reeve E. S. Pond was the only man to qualify for the Reevehip. Deputy Reeve Earl Catherwood who received a nomination for that office, declined to qualify as head of the council and was the only one to qualify for the Deputy Reevehip. On the Council two members of last year's body, Edgar Waldbrook and Warren Jackson have been returned while the third member to qualify was Lorne Porter. Mr. Porter who this time takes his seat by acclamation, was designated in the council race in the last Township election. He is a veteran of the War, having served with the R.C.A.F. Harvey McKenzie, senior member of the 1945 council, did not qualify for office. It is rumored that he may be among the aspirants for the position of Township Road Superintendent, which office has been left vacant by the resignation of Walter Waldbrook.
