SANDUSK W.I. MEET The January meeting of the Sandusk W.I. was held at the home of Mrs. Wm. Leffingwell on Wednesday, January 10th, with sixteen members and one visitor present. The meeting was presided over by the President, J. J. Parsons, in the chair. Roll call, then Mrs. Leffingwell presented a paper on "The Princess Alice Youth News". The program followed. Topic "New Discoveries in Science" was taken by Mrs. Albert Pond. The By-Laws of our municipality were given by Mrs. Wm. Wilson. Report on the use of the "Oven Meats" will be given by Miss Margaret Roy of the Department of Agriculture. All ladies are invited to attend.

Canadian farmers may view this with some apprehension. However it is doubtful if any farmers in the township are being paid a subsidy on their products. They would much rather be paid a straight price rather than a price which is based on the value of the product and the cost of production. This column contains that which is the opinion of many Haldimand farmers. The difficulty remains to get the industry with power to bring sufficient pressure on the authorities to get the proper time can accomplish this. If ever there was a time that farmers should be given a strong functional organization it is now.

As has been intimated earlier, Haldimand farmers are being asked to maintain a certain level of production. They cannot nor can any other group of farmers be expected to do this unless the price is guaranteed. They are now in (spite of all that is said to the contrary) but they will not remain that way should subsidies be removed and the price structure not supported in some other way. It is something worth considering and only organized agriculture can do anything about it.

One step in the right direction has been taken by the hog program. It has been announced that this is the vote on the Hog Marketing Scheme will be passed into effect immediately. Thus the producer is going to have a voice in the setting of the price to be paid for hogs as well as a number of other vexing problems facing that part of our great industry.

Haldimand has long been famous for its alfalfa acreage. In fact this is one of the first counties to grow the crop many years ago. The acreage gradually increased until it was well over the 30,000 mark. Then we had a few "bad" years and many of the "old" fields as well as some of the new were killed out. Recently, however, the crop seems to have been staging a come-back and in 1945 the acreage reported stands at 33,154. With an average yield of approximately 2.5 tons per acre, valuing at a price of \$12.00 per ton (the value of the crop stands at \$1,034,400.00. Thus we have a new million dollar crop.

It has been urged on numerous occasions that farmers in Haldimand would do well to concentrate on fall wheat, corn, and alfalfa along with good pasture and to grow only such other coarse grains as they may need to establish new seedings and for silage production. It would seem that the alfalfa acreage is receiving at least some attention. It is generally agreed that the alfalfa crop to grow and with favourable weather conditions our acreage would be where it should be. The alfalfa leaves the corn, both husing and silage, and the pasture crops to receive attention.

The pasture crop and the importance of improved pasture was given a boost at the crop meeting in Cayuga last week. Mr. Ken Falls in addressing the annual meeting of the Crop Improvement Association gave some interesting facts on pasture improvement. In a progress report on the pasture demonstration it was stated that the province wide average was 188 pasture days per acre on the improved type pasture as compared with 131 pasture days for the old style pasture. In other words the good pasture gave approximately two months extra feeding. Who wouldn't use the better pasture?
