To acknowledge this to be the truth implies that we have become more moronish with each succeeding generation; that the experience of age has provided nothing for the parents to pass on to their children; that bigotry, intolerance and selfishness is narrowing the minds of the human race. Surely the educational and scientific advancements of the twentieth century disproves retrocession in the ability of human inds to think for themselves.

Despite everything derogatory that has been said about the statements of Canada's Deputy Minister of Health he has given everyone mething to think about and while it may be difficult to acknowledge complete truth in what he says, there are many points in his argument that cannot be denied. But by the time it reaches the conversation of hasty newspaper eaders Russia has taken over the Dardanelles.

Radio offers another pitfall for those who believe everything they think they hear. Speculation becomes fact, dramatization reality for

one-ear listeners. With the prestige born of her war effort, Canada is taking a leading place among the smaller nations in world councils. Her voice was heard with respect at San Francisco, her career diplomats are hard at work furthering Canadian ideals in the United Nations Organization. But this new role of Canada's can be played to its logical conclusion at the peace table only with the support of the Canadian people. And the workman, the professional man, the women of the nation must understand what is

being done if Canada's voice is to be strong. One avenue to clear understanding is offered by careful reading of newspapers which are making every effort in their power to bring the world situation before the Canadian people and explain its complexities.
