Normal Apple Crop Unlikely This Year

Apple trees in Eastern Ontario which suffered damage last Spring because of the peculiar weather conditions should not be expected to provide a normal crop this season, according to D. S. Blair, of the horticulture division of the Central Experimental Farm in Ottawa. In a speech at the annual convention of the Ontario Fruit Growers' Association, Mr. Blair said that the crop of apples in Ontario is expected to be about 10 per cent below normal. . . "Those orchards that were badly defoliated, in my opinion, should not be pruned as they will bring every leaf they are unable to bring back into shape. A normal fertilizer and spray program should be followed and where feasible I would recommend commercial fertilizer and non-caustic spray materials," he said.

Growers who stuck to the spraying of trees throughout the season, despite the trying conditions, were able to keep the leaves of their trees reasonably free of scab and no loss of foliage was experienced, Mr. Blair explained.
