Charles R. McCullough's tribute to the founder of the Southam Press, who acquired control of the Spectator in the early years of it's history reveals the greatness of another Canadian City zen, who through zeal and hard work, rose from a humble beginning to head the largest journalistic enterprise in Canada's history.

The story of the life of the late William Southam is remindful of the Horatio Alger series which have proved inspirational to youths with a desire to succeed. After acquiring the Spectator, he later acquired control of Daily papers in Ottawa. Calgary, Edmonton, Winnipeg and Vancouver. They became known as the Southam Newspapers and a national institution. Thus from humble beginning this man rose to the heights by his zeal and industry and the opportunities offered in a free democracy.

THE SCENIC BEAUTY of Ontario's Mus koka district at this time of year defies exaggeration. The writer enjoyed an all too brief trip through that area over the week end and returned in complete agreement with another local resident visiting there who said the district must be a part of Heaven.

The change in scenery starts at Barrie on Lake Simcoe and from there on Southern Ontarionians inhale the atmosphere with growing enthusiasm. Orillia, at the junction of Lake Simcoe and Lake Couchiching is a lovely town, progressive, clean and a model for many in the southern section of the Province. The general scenic beauty improves as you continue toward Gravenhurst and Lake Muskoka. Our journey took us out No. 69 Highway to Bala and Milford Bay on one side and the wide Moon river stretching away on the other. Summer cottages dot the landscape, not in the usual profusion we see them here, but respectable distances apart Each one looks cool and inviting and is surround ed by high pines which seem to stand as sentinals of protection. Bala, like the other little towns along the way, is a resort centre. There s no hustling and everyone seems to be imbued with the loveliness of the natural surroundings in which they live. On our return we could not resist cutting across Highway 12 to Midland and Penetanguishine, passing through such places as Coldwater, Victoria Harbour and Port McNicol. Midland is a thriving town and almost as nice as Editor I. H. Cranston of the Midland Free Press claims it to be. The historical Martyr's Shrine at Fort Ste Marie, near Midland, is worth driving many miles to see and to reflect upon the early history of this Province.

While our trip was altogether too brief we saw enough to be able to say with conviction that the tourist literature issued concerning the Muskoka district is no exaggeration and if you have not been there and happen to be planning a trip you will not be dissappointed if you head toward Northern Ontario.

### VVVV WHAT HAS SWEDEN DONE?

A STORY is going the rounds pointing out the things which Sweden has done in the way of social services, comparing her progress with the efforts of Canada along similar lines. It's a pleasure to see our Canadian up-lifters returning once more to Sweden for their in-spiration. The circle is now complete. They will soon be home again. Sweden was their first love. Since then they have roamed the world pointing out the wonders of other lands, suggesting that other countries and other governments are much wiser, more generous, than

our own. Circumstances make Sweden an excellent country to quote. It is some distance from Canada, we haven't much opportunity for finding facts by direct contact. Its currency unit s different from ours. This permits looseness of statement, some even assuming that crowns have the value of dollars. Sweden has kept out of two wars, provided both sides with am-munition and supplies thus growing rich, through a tragedy in which she had no active part. No one blames the Swedish people for this, they have the right to sell where they can sell for the highest price and they have every right to stay out of war if they are able to do so.

Th's happened with Sweden - not with

Canada. For ten years out of thirty-two, almost a third of that period; from 1914 to 1918, Pen, Scissors and then from 1939 to 1946, we have devoted our efforts to freeing the world from despots, Sweden practically alone among the industrial countries of the world was able to enjoy peace while finding excellent markets among her neighbors.

Our national debt moved up from \$314,000,-000 in 1913 to \$2,248,000,000 in 1920. Not very much of this was paid off between wars. We started again in 1939 with a debt of \$3,152,500,000 on March 31, 1945. There is much more to be aided. This does not represent all our costs. We met a great deal of them out of current income. should be made for varying circumstances. What strange minds some people have! Twenty or thirty years ago few Canadians sought to inspiration in other lands. Oh yes, let us hear about other countries. Almost any nation has some things which others might envy, but let the searchers for help exerise a necasure of detachment, a regard for the realities of the things they are discussing.
