THE 100th ANNIVERSARY edition of the Hamilton Spectator reflects the greatness of the newspaper and is full of historical data that could be read with profit to everyone concerned with the progress and development of this particular part of Canada.

Charles R. McCullough's tribute to the founder of the Southern Press, who acquired control of the Spectator in the early years of its history reveals the greatness of another Canadian Citizen, who through zeal and hard work, rose from a humble beginning to head the largest journalistic enterprise in Canada's history.

The story of the life of the late William Southern is reminiscent of the Horatio Alger series which have proved inspirational to youths with a desire to succeed. He was taken on the staff of the London Free Press at the age of twelve. A few years later, through his industry and zeal, he was given a partnership in the business. After acquiring the Spectator, he later acquired control of Daily papers in Ottawa, Calgary, Edmonton, Winnipeg and Vancouver. They became known as the Southern Newspapers and a national institution. Thus from a humble beginning this man rose to the heights by his zeal and industry and the opportunities offered in a free democracy.

We like to think the same opportunities are afforded young men of today, but the pioneering spirit seems to be lost in the times. The age of individualism is past and the average man seems content to go along with the tide.

WHAT HAS SWEDEN DONE?

A STORY is going the rounds pointing out the things which Sweden has done in the way of social services, comparing her progress with the efforts of Canada along similar lines.

It's a pleasure to see our Canadian up-lifters returning home now to Sweden for their inspiration. The circle is now complete. They will soon be home again. Sweden was their first love. Since then they have roamed the world pointing out the wonders of other lands, suggesting that other countries and other governments are much wiser, more generous, than our own.

Circumstances make Sweden an excellent country to quote. It is some distance from Canada, we haven't much opportunity for finding facts by direct contact. Its currency unit is different from ours. This permits looseness of statement, some even assuming that crowns have the value of dollars. Sweden has kept out of two wars, provided both sides with ammunition and supplies, thus growing rich, through a tragedy in which she had no active part. No one blames the Swedish people for this, they have the right to sell where they can sell for the highest price and they have every right to stay out of war if they are able to do so.

It's happened with Sweden — not with Canada. For ten years out of thirty-two, almost a third of that period; from 1914 to 1918, then from 1939 to 1945, we have devoted our efforts to freeing the world from despots. Sweden practically alone among the world's leading nations has been able to enjoy peace while finding excellent markets among her neighbors.

Our national debt moved up from \$314,000,000 in 1913 to \$2,248,000,000 in 1920. Not very much of this was paid off between wars. We started again in 1919 with a debt of \$1,525,500,000 and the debt grew until it reached \$11,298,000,000 on March 31, 1945. There is much more to be added. This does not represent all our debts. We met a great deal of them out of current income. Sweden directed her efforts to other things — we by force of circumstances had to go to war. In any comparison allowance should be made for varying circumstances. What strange minds some people have! Twenty or thirty years ago few Canadians sought for inspiration in other lands. But now when Canada is a leader among the nations, when everywhere there are words of astonishment and praise for our accomplishments, there are many whose minds roam over foreign lands seeking for means to disparage their own.

The Week in Ottawa

With upwards of 50,000 Canadian workers idle due to strikes, the Commons Industrial Disputes Committee is called into action to study the labor difficulties expected during the new-developed steel strike.

Prime Minister Mackenzie King acceded the motion in record time. The committee immediately began investigations into the steel strike, interviewing labor and management representatives in the plants which direct the Dominion's steel industry at Hamilton, Sault Ste. Marie, Ont. and Sydney, N.S.

After lengthy criticism of the budget by the Opposition, Finance Minister Lloyd Munnich was asked to defend the 1947 budget and say how the tax exemptions could not have been made possible until next year.

Mr. Lloyd Munnich said that the 1947 budget was a revenue from the income tax for that year would be impossible to present budgeted into force until the end of August.
