This is the time of the year to get after the weeds on your farm. Lar-ge weeds in the yards, along fence yows, and on the roadsides, while erhaps not causing any great ancial loss, do make a place very unattractive and give visitors a very poor impression. A great many of se plants on fence rows produce nough seed to seed down a good eal of the farm fields and here they result in a financial loss, partly pecause of a lower grade of grain and seed, but mainly because they use up the moisture and nutrients so essential to plant growth.

Some weeds may be rogued out of rain fields by hand. This is only the weed is small. Some weeds such as mustad may be killed by spraying or dusting with Sinox or some other Cyanide preparation. The new weed-killing 2-4-D, also a selective type of weed-killer, will kill nearly all broad leaved plants, but has little or no effect on grasses or cereals. This chemical is especially commended for removing dandedions and plantain from lawns, for getting rid of unsightly patches of burdock, and for killing patches of field bindweed and chicory in cultivated fields. This chemical does not t rapidly, so do not pass judgmen on its effectiveness before about a PROFESSIONAL CARDS onth after its application.

Weeds in pastures are another great problem. They are more often the result of understocking the pasture, than overstocking it.
