**On the Farm Front**

**BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER**

Most Haldimand farmers are interested in ways and means of cutting costs in hay making. Many have already found short-cuts that have whittled down both time and cost but recent studies made in both Haldimand and New York show a wide range in costs from farm to farm. In Minnesota one farmer put up a ton of hay every ninety-three minutes while a nearby farmer needed one hundred and seventy-two minutes to get the same job done.

In New York the results were about the same with the time varying from ninety minutes to as much as two hundred and twenty-eight minutes. Naturally equipment has a good deal to do with the time factor. Some farmers are trying to do the job with a two-ton investment of around \$250.00 while others have nearly \$2,000.00 tied up. The most time consuming part of the job was found to be the moving of the crop from the windrow to the hay mow.

Invariably it was revealed in these studies, farmers were able to cut the time and thereby the costs very considerably by using tractors and trucks that could be driven at higher speeds than horses. It is interesting to note that the change could in most cases be made without any very heavy extra investment.

For instance the buck rake proved itself to be a very helpful implement. It did the job easier and quicker than any other type of equipment. Furthermore a combination of a buck rake and a blower made by removing the fan assembly and blower pipe from an old threshing machine and mounting on skids or wheels required the least time of any combination of implements in getting the hay from the field to the mow. The only hand work necessary was pitching the loose hay into the blower.

It is interesting to note in these same studies, that the loader and wagon method consumed the most time although was not necessarily the most expensive. However, the labour and equipment costs were low set in the case of the buck rake and blower method. This method has been directed towards the buck rake in recent months.

In practising a system of rotational pasturing it is sometimes difficult to divide a field without extra lanes and more wire. Norman Hartwick in Eastman Township seems to have at least partially solved the problem. He has placed his outlet gate at the corner of the field and has divided the field diagonally with an electric fence from the gate to the opposite corner. It is then very easy to turn the cattle over from one extra lane to build and the cattle always go in the same gate.

Many questions are being asked about the use of DDT as an insecticide. Perhaps the best answer that can be given at the moment is that this material has not yet been used so liberally by the farmer that its dangers and usefulness. Its effectiveness in the control of potato beetles has not been demonstrated and potato growers are very hopeful of the results to be obtained. DDT has been found to be very useful in the control of stable flies, houseflies, mosquitos and possibly other household insect nuisances. It shows promise with certain vegetable crops but full list is not yet available.

Calling the poultry flock is one of the most effective ways of cutting costs. Drones are always a liability. If hens are not laying at this season of the year they are not likely to lay at other time so now is a good time to pick out the non-layers. Remove them now, don't wait until market day. It would be a good plan to have a special pen for coveys, set aside for the culled.

**On the Farm Front**

BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER

In spite of rationing, Canadians have never eaten more or better food than they have during recent years. This is borne out by statistics on meat consumption. For instance, the average consumption of meat per capita during the years 1935 to 1939 inclusive was 111.8 pounds whereas in 1944 this had increased to 141 pounds.

Hog marketing has not varied to any great extent in Eastern Canada. This is not the case, however, in Western Canada, where the marketing rose from approximately a million and a half head in 1939 to about six million head in 1944. As a matter of fact, hog exports have been in direct proportion to the marketing of cattle. Canadian hog marketing statistics provided by Mr. W. P. Watson of the Live Stock Branch.

During May of this year 1942 hogs were marketed by Haldimand Farmers. Of this number 947 or 49.78 per cent were in Grade A. A further analysis of the marketing, however, indicates too high a percentage of hogs in the heavy classes. For instance, in B 3 there were 62 hogs. A total of 13.37 per cent of the hogs marketed were in Out Grades. These were very large; the result of holding hogs until they were too heavy for marketing. This too had increased to 141 pounds.
