TEMPERANCE---

THE SUB-HEADING on an article on Beverage Rooms by Morley Murray, in Mac Lean's Magazine recently was: "The wets don't like it. The drys detest it. The Government is stuck with it." Murray's description of the beverage room sets in words the thoughts of all fair thinking people.

The Canadian institute of Public Opinion reported on a poll taken a couple of years ago that Seventy-seven per cent of Canadians opposed prohibition -which incidently is the ideal of the Canadian Temperance Federation. Another poll by the same organization reported that fifty-five per cent of women and twentyeight per cent of men in Canada do not drink. That is about forty per cent of all Canadian adults claim to be abstainers. It will be seen therefore that an appreciable percentage of the abstainers do not approve of prohibition.

While prohibition is the ideal of the Temperance forces - certainly a worthy ideal - it interesting to note they are not pressing at the moment for prohibition. We have always maintained that prohibition was the wrong approach to the cause of true temperance and that the Temperance Federation in pursuing that course was working against the end they hoped to achieve. In 1942 only fifty-seven per cent of Canadians were opposed to Prohibition. This number is now increased to seventy-seven per cent. It would not appear therefore that the Federation through its prohibitionist policy has achieved the hoped for results.

In adopting a less dogmatic course of action the Temperance Federation can enlist the support of many thousands more people. The experience of beverage rooms, as they are conducted in all too many instances, should also swing to them support from a growing body of people. The revised liquor policy of the Ontario Government is looked for with expectancy and hope that it will bring about better conditions and we hope the Ontario Temperance Federation will give the Government support in what the average Ontarioian hopes will obtain and that is an approach toward true temperance. TAX FREE INDEMNITIES-

THE DOMINION PARLIAMENT apparently started something when the members voted themselves a \$2,000. tax free increase in indemnities. The Province of Ontario is now proceeding with a bill classifying sessional indemnities of Legislative members as tax-free expense allowances.

One thing is essentially certain and that is —if Federal representatives of the people merit a \$2,000. tax free stipend in addition to a taxable indemnity of \$4,000., Provincial members are entitled to exemption of the total \$2,000. they receive.
