Q. How can I remove a glass stopper from a bottle without breaking it, when every method seems unavailing?

How Christ Changes People
Acts 17:1-7; 1 Thes. 1:2-8
Golden Text: "Be not weary in well-doing."—1 Thes. 5:13.

Paul had at this time a uniform mode of procedure: first, he began with the Jews at their regular place of meeting, the synagogue. Second, he made use of the Sabbath Day, the regular Jewish day of assembly. Those already Christians met on the first day of the week for their own distinctive service. Paul wisely made use of their day, as missionaries among the Jews still do. Third, he reasoned with them from the Scriptures. Nothing else has the power to convince and regenerate men that the Word of God has.

The Gospel Victorious
A church was fashioned out of the raw material of the pagans of Thessalonica, as they were converted under the effective preaching of Paul. After they were regenerated by the Holy Spirit, they lived nobly and true for Christ. They were now complimented by the Jews and the Gentiles as "the labor of love." These former pagans now knew they were the children of God.

The Thessalonians soon developed into saints. They suffered, but through all their suffering they came to know Jesus better. From points which they personally evangelized the gospel further spread through the outlying districts. Their faith in God had thus gone forth and it resounded far and wide throughout that section of Southern Europe.

In his preaching, Paul emphasized three points: (1) The Christ must suffer before he can save. (2) The Christ must rise again from the dead. (3) The Christ must come again. These three points were the foundation of the Christian faith. Paul's message was simple and direct. He did not use high-sounding words or complicated arguments. He simply told the people what he believed and why.

New German Trials
In Nuremberg, Germany, Brig. Gen. Telford Taylor, chief counsel for the American war crimes court, said between 250 and 500 former Nazi military, industrial, financial and governmental leaders would be arraigned in a series of trials expected to last at least through 1947.

Revolt Plot in Spain

TABLE TALKS

School Lunches

Many mothers wonder how they can possibly prepare a lunch box that will satisfy the hearty appetites of their school-going children. After trying, and they admit not always successfully, to fill them up all summer, they worry because they are not able to put in the lunch box the same quality of food that the children consume when at a home meal. The point to remember when preparing carried lunches, is that quality must replace quantity, which in other words means that the small amount of food in the lunch box must give that well satisfied feeling.

Certain schools have cooking or at least warming up facilities, this eliminates the problem of keeping something hot for lunch. Thermos bottles now easily available can be used when these facilities do not exist. In these, soups, macaroni or spaghetti, baked beans, chowders, stews, hash, etc., are easily kept hot and ready to eat. If the child has the stay-at-home meals have the same lunch it makes him feel more satisfied with his lot.

The home economists of the Consumer Section of the D.D.A. suggest recipes which will prove good either at home or at school.

DOCKERS BAKE
2 tablespoons fat
2 pound minced beef or left-over cooked meat
1 onion, sliced
2 cups grated raw potato (4-5 medium p. potatoes)
1 tablespoon vinegar
1 cup rolled oats (quick-cooking)
1 teaspoon salt
3/4 teaspoon poultry seasoning
Melt fat in frying pan, add minced meat and onion and brown. To the grated potatoes add the remaining ingredients, then add the cooked meat. Blend thoroughly. Press into a greased loaf pan in a moderately hot oven, 375°F., for 1 1/2 hours. Hot servings.
