for seed. Any farming mill, regardless of age, will do fairly good work providing there are good screens and the fans are in good working condition. The mill should be operated where there is an abundance of light and above all, it should be level and solid and the feeding surface with the power being applied uniformly. The operating speed of a fanning mill is around forty revolutions per minute.

This is the season of the year when dirty eggs are apt to appear. These can be prevented very largely by providing one clean well bedded nest for every four or five birds by providing clean pens and a clean or screened off dropping-board. If the yards are wet, the flock should be confined until noon on wet days and the layers should be kept out of wet and dirty barnyards. Poultry should be prevented by closing the nests at night and removing all broody hens.

A recent article in an American publication discusses the subject "Where are Turkeys Headed?" It is believed that Halimand producers are asking the same three questions, namely "How Many Turkeys are consumers willing to buy at present prices?" "What size turkey will be most profitable?" "At the moment the price is probably the most important in Ontario. The question is 'should producers aim for large or small birds?' It is felt that the hotel and restaurant trade will need to be increased. Prices that will make the average household not likely to absorb many twenty pound birds or better.
