Milk Will Still Be Cheap Food

In Comparison With Average Prices in United States It Is a Bargain

Now that Canadians know to pay more for the milk delivered to their doorstep, many will ask: "Is it necessary?" The dairy farmer, with no longer get his Dominion bonus of 55 cents and the consumer must pay that amount plus a further increase to compensate for higher production costs, says the Ottawa Journal.

The whole matter of price has been turned over to the Provincial Boards, who for weeks now have been hearing the claims of farmers for increases and the demands of consumer representatives that it will be injurious to the health of Canadians if milk consumption is reduced as a result of too high prices. There is something to be said on both sides.

Coming on top of the loss of the two-cent-a-quart consumer's subsidy earlier this summer, the further increase of three cents on October 1 is going to dent the housewife's budget. But it also means relief for the Dominion Treasury as the major part of the increases which the consumer will be called upon to pay formerly came out of taxes.

Should the increases actually result in decreased consumption there will be real cause for worry. Canada's general standard of health has been on the upgrade, and milk consumption—we now use more per capita than the people of any other country—has played an important part.

Milk has become a standard food in almost every Canadian home. Even at 15 cents a quart milk will remain one of the cheapest foods which the housewife can purchase. At nearly three ounces for a cent, and considering all its food values, milk is still cheap food. Even as a leverage it is cheaper than almost any other that can be purchased. The average bottle of "pop" for instance costing around a cent an ounce. In comparison with what the average U.S. housewife must pay milk in Canada is a bargain.

In the northern U.S. the 32-ounce quart (the Canadian quart is 40 ounces) costs 17 to 22 cents. Most controversy will be over the demand of producers and distributors in many provinces, including Ontario, for price advances in excess of the subsidy. But labor and all costs are jumping up these days, and the costs of dairy farmers and milk distributors are no exception. If only an increase equivalent to the amount of the subsidy loss were asked, about one and a half cent a quart, neither farmers nor distributors would get anything more than they do at present.

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How Can I?

Q. How can I temporarily stop a leak in the wash tub?
A. Press firmly some ordinary soap into the crack from the outside. This will prove satisfactory until a permanent repair can be made.

Q. How can I prevent water when melting chocolate?
A. Much of the chocolate is wasted because it sticks to the sides and bottom of the container. This can be prevented by greasing pans thoroughly before putting in the chocolate.

Q. How can I cork glue so that the cork will not stick and break when the glue is to be used again?
A. Rub vaseline or cold cream on the cork before inserting into the bottle.

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TABLE TALKS . . . A Sweet Story . .

There are some advantages in using honey as a substitute for sugar. It doesn't remain undissolved in the bottom of the cup when used to sweeten beverages as sugar often does. Liquid honey, watered slightly and drizzled over the morning cereal adds flavour and sweetness. It makes an excellent sweetener for fresh or cooked fruits. For example, mixed with a little cloves or cinnamon it adds a new note to baked pears or apples.

Part of the sugar may be replaced with an equal quantity of honey in baking. Cookies and cakes retain their moisture longer when honey is used, but because of this hygroscopic property of honey, that is its ability to absorb and hold moisture, it should not be stored in the refrigerator or in a damp place. It will absorb moisture and gradually become diluted to the point where spoilage will occur. Honey should be stored covered in a dry place. The pantry shelf is as good a place as any.

If granulated honey should start to ferment, it may be reclaimed by heating slowly over hot water or by setting the container (if water-proof) directly in hot water, until honey is completely liquid. Stir and cool as quickly as possible. It is a good idea to give this treatment to any honey which is to be stored in any quantity for a length of time.

The recipes for today feature honey, and it is suggested that any one of them would make a nice addition to the Thanksgiving menu.

APPLE SQUASH SCALLOP
4 cups squash cut in 1/4-in. slices
3 medium apples sliced (about 3 cups)
1/4 cup honey
1 tablespoon water
1 cup soft stale bread crumbs
1 tablespoon fat, melted
1 teaspoon poultry seasoning
Pepper
1 1/2 teaspoon salt

Place alternate layers of squash and sliced apples in a greased casserole. Drizzle each layer with honey, sprinkle with salt and pepper. Add water. Top last layer with crumbs which have been mixed with the melted fat, poultry seasoning, salt and pepper. Bake in a moderate oven 350 deg. F. for 45 minutes or until squash and apples are tender. Six servings.

SPANISH CREAM
1 tablespoon gelatine
1/4 cup cold water
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups milk
2 eggs yolks
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
3 tablespoons honey (liquid or granulated)
8 eggs whites

Soak gelatine in cold water. Add salt to milk and heat in double boiler. Beat egg yolks slightly and pour hot milk slowly into them, stirring constantly. Return to double boiler and cook until thickened, about ten minutes, or until mixture coats a silver spoon. Remove from heat, add vanilla and gelatine and stir until gelatine is dissolved. Chill until mixture just begins to thicken, then fold in meringue made by beating honey and egg whites together until stiff. Pour into mould rinsed with cold water or lightly greased, and chill until firm. Six servings.
