The former chief of the Luftwaffe and economic mobilizer of Germany had taken potassium cyanide in his cell even as Allied officials were coming to take him to the execution chamber. He died in a few seconds. In his place, Ribbentrop — Hitler's foreign minister — was executed first. Then, in quick succession, the rest died for their crimes, Master Sgt. John Woods of the United States Army was chief executioner and he said later that there was no hitch.

Each child should go regularly to the dentist. The School Nurses check the teeth of each pupil in the classrooms but cavities, when they can be seen in the child's mouth, are too often quite extensive.
