THE WEEK AT OTTAWA (continued from page one) effort to retain her best customer and stimulate trade generally. With an anxious eye on other markets, she also signed her first trade agreement with Mexico and Colombia. The trade department's main problem was getting the goods to sell in those countries moved in to fill the fore-ordered domestic demand for consumer goods was also high. With strikes for higher wages, demands for higher returns for farmers and requests for removal of wartime controls, the price ceiling, so far successful, was endangered. Threatened with inflation pressure from outside countries, particularly the United States, Canada fixed the value of the Canadian dollar at par with the U.S. dollar. In keeping also with the Dominion's status was its participation in a national development. Reconstruction Minister Howe obtained passage of a bill establishing the Atomic Energy Control Board which will control atomic energy development in Canada and carry out nationally the international policies of the Atomic Energy Commission. Finally, Canada's new national standing was reflected in the Season's stand on immigration. It was formed, most parliamentarians felt that the country's new status and attitude a greater backing than 11,000,000 people. Most urged an aggressive policy of selective immigration which would bring in persons capable of developing Canada's natural resources. Some government policy was expected soon. While he sought ideas on military matters from the Canadian chiefs of staff, his visit was mainly ceremonial. He also had a message about the service in general: The soldier was not chiefly a military figure but primarily a social figure who must be regarded as an integral part of the community. His duty was to defend his country and he had no part in politics. The soldier must assume his country's politics were right. The army was built upon discipline and comradeship and the strength of a nation or of its army depended on its character and morale. Of leadership, Monty gave this recipe for victory: "You decide how you are going to win the battle and then relentlessly force your plan on the enemy. No matter how he wriggles or how he thrusts do not be diverted from your winning plan. If you do this you will win."

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THE WEEK AT OTTAWA

Ottawa, Sept. 11 - (CP) - Canada's parliamentarians and cabinet ministers scattered to various points last week after the trials of a heavy session, but Prime Minister Mackenzie King came back from the Paris Peace Conference with the news. Calling a press conference, Mr. King cleared up a number of loose parliamentary ends with definite government announcements which settled speculation concerning Canada's affairs both at home and abroad. The diplomatic front provided the most spectacular news as Mr. King abandoned his 20-year role as minister of external affairs. The prime minister handed over to Justice Minister St. Laurent the job which has been held by Canadian chiefs of state for more than two decades. While parliament had passed, during the last session, a bill providing for a separate minister of external affairs, this was the first government action to meet opposition demands that the bill be put into force. Justice Minister St. Laurent will hold the portfolio until the end of the year when a new external affairs minister will be appointed. Diplomatic shuffles announced the movement of Norman Robertson, under-secretary of state, to the London. High Commissioner's post vacated several months ago by Vincent Massey. L. B. (Mike) Pearson, Washington ambassador, to the under-secretary's job, and Hume Wrong, associate under-secretary of state, to the Washington ambassador's post. However, there will still be this cabinet shuffle at the close of this year, before the new parliamentary session opens late in January, 1947. These presumably will involve several ministerial shuffles. It is reported to have grown tired of their onerous wartime duties, and to be seeking quieter work. Among such ministers are Finance Minister Lisley and Reconstruction Minister Howe.
