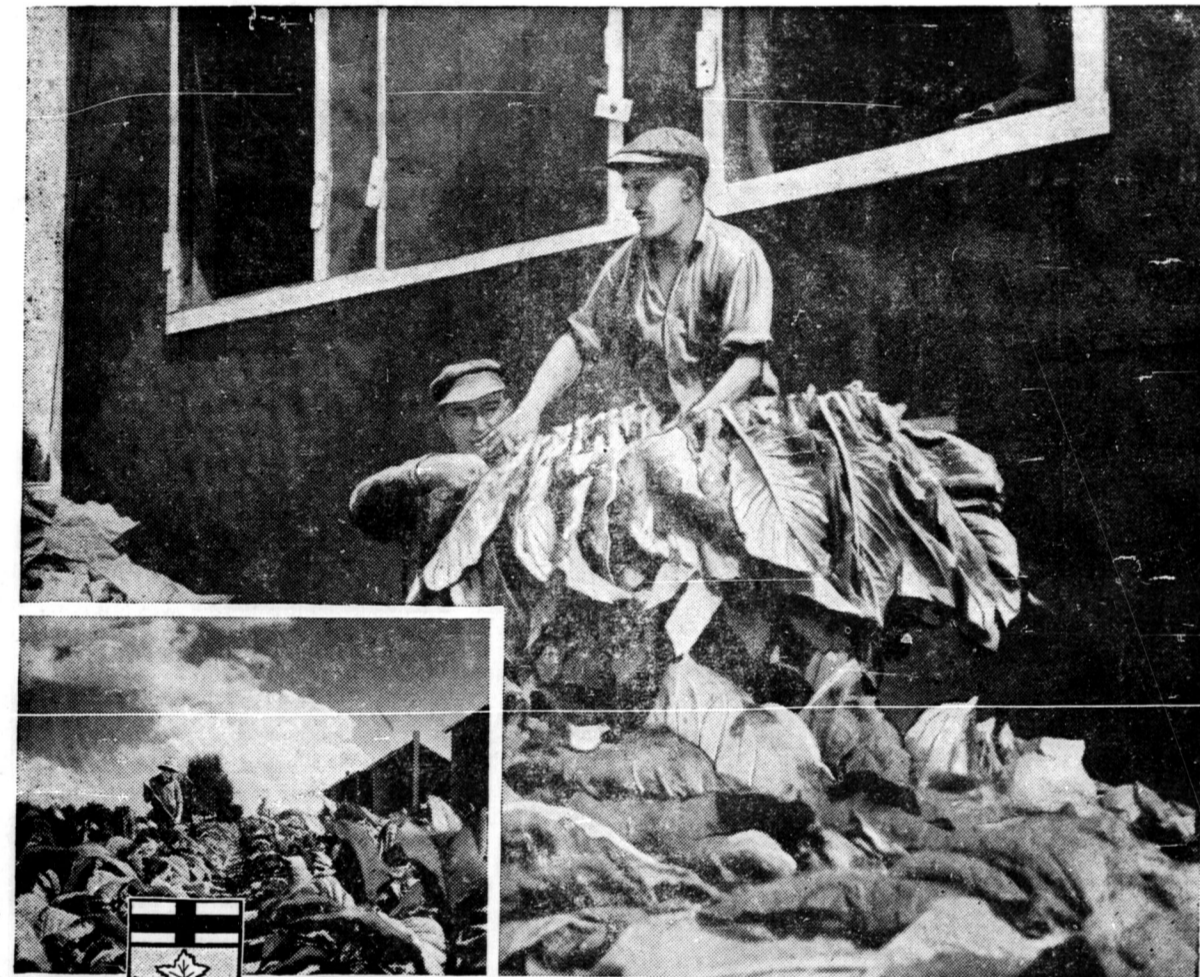


CANADA'S HORSES TO HELP REBUILD EUROPE

HOME CONDITIONS SAID TO BE CAUSE OF CRIME

Toronto — "The worst criminals in Canada today are between the ages of 16 and 19," according to L. Col. Wallace Buntion, head of the Salvation Army Prison and Police Court Services Department.

"Veterans of service with the armed forces have not been responsible for even the share of crime that could be attributed to them on a percentage of population basis," he said.

It is possible to trace back to the home 99 per cent of the major crime in Canada, Col. Buntion declared. This does not always mean poor homes because some criminals come from prosperous homes.

The home is first, the school second and the church third in the proper upbringing of the young," said Col. Buntion.

Home conditions are reflected in school conduct and where school conduct is bad there should be investigation of home conditions.

The Salvation Army prison department has 92 officers across Canada engaged in full or part-time reclamation work among prisoners.

Then, too, there is not enough church work among young children.

It is further stated that the Commission will accept evidence under oath if permissible, it is strongly urged that all witnesses take the form of written affidavits, as to the form of which the Commission's counsel will give any assistance that may be required.

All briefs or oral evidence presented at the public hearing will be given proper consideration by the Commission in its report and recommendations.

In order to facilitate the work of the Commission, it is requested that briefs be forwarded to the Commission, at its office at the Secretary of Forestry, Administration Building, Level Small Arms Plant, Toronto, 14, to reach the office of the Commissioner at least one month before the hearing at which their consideration is desired.
