Mr. Young said experiments had shown that dough kept in frozen state for six months could retain its flavor when formed into rolls or pie crust.











medium egg plant Boiling salted water tablespoons mild-flavor 1 small green pepper, chopped 1 small onion, chopped a tablespoons flour teaspoon salt

Egg Plant Creole

1 tablespoon brown sugar 8 large tomatoes (peeled and chopped) OR 2 cups canned tomatoe

teaspoon cloves. 14 cup bread crumbs 1 tablespoon buttter OR tablespoons grated cheese

Peel and dice egg plant. Cook for 10 minutes in a little boiling, salted water. Drain. Place in greased baking dish. Melt fat, add green pepper and onion and saute 2 min-utes. Add flour, salt and sugar, blend well. Add tomatoes, crushed bay leaf and cloves, and cor cooking 5 minutes. Pour the tomato sauce over egg plant and top with bread crumbs which have been combined with the butter or grated cheese. Bake in moderat

11/2 cups sliced sour apples 1/3 cup brown sugar strips side bacon, diced

1/2 teaspoon salt Arrange half the squash in greased casserole. Cover with half the apples. Sprinkle with half the sugar and salt and add half the bacon. Repeat with remaining ingredients. Cover and bake in moderately slow oven, 325 deg. F, for 30 minutes. Uncover and bake until apples are soft and top is browned, about 18 minutes longer.


Potatoes in Green Peppers

2 tablespoons flour

3 cups diced cooked potatoes Wash peppers, cut in half lengthwise and remove seeds. Parboil, uncovered, in salted water until ten der but not soft. Drain. Melt fat add flour and blend well. Add milk stirring constantly until mixture thickens. Add salt, pepper and cheese. Stir until cheese is melted.

Many people do not like leru lem Artichokes because they don't know how to cook them. Th artichokes (Jerusalem) should be pared and dropped in cold acidulated water, that is water (1 quart) to which I teaspoon of lemon juice vinegar has been added. This will prevent the artichokes from colouring. After being drained they are cooked like other vegeables in a small amount of boiling salted water, until tender then
