JUNIOR JOTTINGS

Club work for 1947 is being organized this month and a letter is being sent to all 1946 club members and members of the Haldimand Junior Farmers' Association.

The following Clubs are being planned for 1947:

Swine Club - Two - One centred in the Caledonia district and sponsored by the Caledonia Agricultural Society and a new club in the Fisherville or Dunnville area sponsored by the Haldimand Yorkshire Breeders' Club. It has also been suggested that a special class or club be arranged for the sows shown by the Caledonia Club members of last year.

Calf Club - Two - A Dairy and a Beef Calf Club will be largely composed of Hoteliers but other Dairy breeds can enter and if sufficient numbers warrant, it can be divided into two sections, namely Holstein section and an Ayrshire section. The Herford section sponsored by the Haldimand Herford breeders will be composed of two sections, the Herford section sponsored by the Caledonia and District Dual-Purpose Club members of last year.

Grain Club - The Dunnville Club is expected to re-organize as a second year project with at least 3 acres per member being sown. If sufficient interest is shown a 1st year Beaver Club will be started. There are possibilities of a grain club in the Caledonia area with a section for those growing corn for grain.

These are not necessarily the only clubs to be organized if the required number of members enrol.

The 1947 Club Rules and Regulations are similar to those of former years. Members must be twelve years of age. May 1st and not have reached their 21st birthday on November 1st of this year. Both boys and girls are eligible for all these clubs. Club enrolment forms have not yet arrived. Further information may be secured by writing to the Department of Agriculture, Cayuga Ontario.
