Toronto, April 30 - (CP) - The cost of food will remain high until a short age of 5,000 farmhands in Ontario is met, Agricultural Minister T. L. Kennedy said this week.

Although his department had arranged for five hundred Dutch workers to be placed on Ontario farms this month, they supplied only a fraction of the number required.

Despite activities of the Junior Farmers' movement, young people continue to leave the farms for jobs in cities which pay more for less work, he said.

"As long as this trend continues and farms are undermanned, there is no possibility of any reduction in price of farm products," the minister warned.
