April 30 - (CP) - A House of Commons committee on redistricting is expected to report on the committee's findings in the next few days. The committee is to report on the redistribution bill to increase the number of members of the House of Commons from 265 to 305. Because of the population of Quebec which will gain eight seats, the measure, which was introduced on May 6, 73, Ontario increased by one to 83, and Manitoba by one to 12.

Toronto truck shop operators were openly sympathetic and said a general trend to voluntary boycott had been under way since chocolate bars included spiraling prices last year.

Said one proprietor: "Youngsters are angry because they haven't eight cents to spend on a bar while adults have more sense than to spend hard-earned money so foolishly."

A health survey of Canadian schools has reported that forty-eight per cent of Ontario secondary school principals favor special instruction on social and sex problems by the medical profession.

The survey, taken by the National Committee for School Health Research, said the principals considered 30 per cent of their students "are sufficiently prepared to meet their social and sexual problems."

The committee, twenty-one point four per cent of secondary school principals considered "present methods of teaching health are satisfactory."

Asked to comment F. J. Bartlett, Ontario director of physical and health education, said: "The great weight of leading educational opinion on this continent and elsewhere favors the integration of education in a general health course."

He admitted that there had been no move to have sex education taught as a subject in itself. The tendency in the province, he said, was for it to become a special event subject.

Plans Being Made To Collect Gifts in Flood Relief Drive

The organization of the British Flood Relief Campaign sponsored by the Government of Ontario, is now well under way. The dates of the collection have been fixed for May 1st to May 15th, and it will cover clothing (including bedding, towels, bath towels, linens, curtains etc.), Food and Money.

Central Committee has been set up under the Chairmanship of Hon. Russell T. Kelley, Minister of Health, with Mr. Christie A. McDonald, who organized the collection of clothing for Europe last year, as the Provincial Director. Local Committees are being set up throughout the Province and information and suggestions are being issued to Local Committees as soon as the Central Committee is notified of their formation.

The initial collection of Food and clothing is to be organized through local depots at schools, churches, fire halls, etc. and the public will be asked to leave their donations at these depots and house to house collections during the closing days of the campaign will be organized in many areas. Preliminary sorting and packing will be done by teams of volunteers at the local depots and the Food and Clothing will then be sent to Central Warehouses, set up throughout the Province by the Central Committee, for final packing for shipment to Britain. Clothing will be pressure-balled to facilitate transport and save shipping space.

It has been decided by the Provincial Government that the Campaigns will also include Monetary Donations. The collection will be organized by the Local Committees and official receipts will be issued which will be accepted by the Income Tax authorities as evidence of a deductible item for income tax purposes. The money will be paid into a Central Provincial fund and food will be purchased in bulk in Ontario for shipment to Britain.

The need for Food and Clothing in Britain is desperate and the public is urged to support Ontario's own British Flood Relief Campaign in every way possible.

The Government is most anxious that the donations should be morale building as well as helpful and should create credit to Ontario. It is hoped that the gifts will be of the highest quality but any serviceable garment or piece of material or any non-perishable foods which can be spared will be welcomed.

W.M.S. Executive Conference

The Hamilton Conference Branch Executive met at the Y.W.C.A. in Hamilton and closed on Friday, April 25th. The President, Mrs. L. B. Turford, of Beamsville, presided. The need for workers in home and foreign fields, and mission fields, was urged under the "Need-in-Asia" project, the China field has been allocated to the W.M.S. and was considered for the conference for all United Church Women to be held in June 3-6 at Wesley University in Hamilton.

The allocation for the year 1946-47 was accepted. During the year 1946 the sum of \$105,770 had been raised, of this \$104,900.00 was sent to the Dominion Board and a further sum of \$4,721.00 has been raised to date for the Angola Bible Fund. The attendance for the year 1946-47 was approximately 112.8 per cent of their allocation which is \$6,700.00 and an average of \$59.31 for the Angola Bible Fund.
