BIRD NOTES

Diving Ducks are the ones most often seen on our large lakes, usually in great numbers. These birds all dive for food and do not tip up as the surface feeding ducks do. One of the most handsome ducks of this group is the Canvasback. It is all white with a reddish-brown head and neck and a solid black breast. It is a favorite of the hunters, and is often found in company with the hooded ducks. The Redhead is similar to the Canvasback but is mostly gray instead of white. Its reddish head and black breast and neck, while the bill is blue. This present species has an abrupt appearance to the forehead, while the Canvasback has a tapering sloping forehead in the silhouette.

Another diving duck that is found in the company with the two mentioned above is the Ring-Necked Duck. The front parts, head and back are black, the sides dull gray and there is a white mark just in front of the wing at the shoulder. As its name implies there is a dull chestnut ring around the neck but the bird must be very close at hand in order to make out the ring.

All of the ducks described above congregate together during migrations along the shores of our Great Lakes, and it is the members of this group that usually fall prey to the hunter's gun.
