penditure of \$963.44 and leaving a net balance on hand of \$435.71. The Secretary's report reviewed the year's work and emphasized the splendid work of the plowboys of the county who had entered the competitions at the International Match at Kingston. Particular mention was made of the achievement of Mr. W. W. Hare who had brought honour to himself and to his native county by capturing one of the championship prizes and a trip to Great Britain.

The Treasurer's report indicated that the cash situation during the past year had been the largest in the history of the organization and expressed the genuine thanks of the directors to all those who had assisted in the work of promoting soil cultivation and promoting improved soil cultivation in the county by contributing to the funds.

Grants from the Ontario Government, the County Council and the Walpole Council had amounted to \$375.00. Expenses included cash prizes amounting to \$359.50. Operation of the match cost a total of \$203.22 and the cost of cowboys' prizes amounting to \$213.31.
