On the Farm Front
 — By Halldmand Harry —
 It is not too early to make plans for the seeding of that new permanent pasture. Most everyone agrees that an improved pasture will give more pasture days and pounds of milk than an ordinary one. This has been demonstrated time and again and more recently in the past few demonstrations throughout the county and Province. It has just been announced that during 1946, demonstration plots averaged 175 bushels of pasture per acre, whereas best plots yielded only 121 pasture bushels. This increase of 54 days pasture almost eight weeks, would certainly indicate that an improved pasture pays. Much of the improvement has been the result of the adoption of White Dutch Clover, Ladino vetch, Orchard Grass, and Meadow fescue to the more commonly used vetch and pasture species; alfalfa and timothy.

The fact has also been demonstrated that it pays to give more attention to the details of management of whatever interval, weekly, bi-weekly, and some even daily has proven the appearance but increase the quality of the feed as well as the yield. Complete information on pasture mixtures suitable for Halldmand County, can be secured through the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa.

Some rather startling figures on projected slaughtering have just come to light. For instance, during the week ending January 22nd, 25 head of beef cattle were slaughtered in Canada. During the same week of last year these slaughtering sales totalled 34,206. This represents a decrease of 29 per cent. In a sense, explain why some people missing their customary roast the week-end.

It is somewhat different situation to exist in the United States. For week previous (latest figures available) namely week ending January 14th, a total of 27,850 head of beef cattle were slaughtered in the United States. This represents an increase of more than 167,000 head of cattle slaughtered in the United States. Whereas Canadian figures show, American figures are up 11 per cent.

It is also interesting to note the age taking place in the relationship between live stock prices. For instance, in comparing good butcher's with live bacon hogs on the farm, the discussion took place in the percentage of the cost of 100 pounds of live bacon was \$11.11 as against \$7.77. During the year 1946 this had risen to \$12.22, a 10 per cent increase. It is no wonder, it will be a skating party, neither, there will be the regular meeting.

A resolution was passed asking that the Health of Animals Branch of the Dominion Government resume as rapidly as possible the work of TB accreditation along the same lines as were pursued prior to the war and that certain countries of the world be excluded from the importation of cattle to ensure higher wages, better working conditions and more contented and industrious workers. So far from being contented and industrious, the workers have been deserting the mines, and those who have remained have been taking things easy, with the result that there is a serious shortage of coal for domestic and industrial use.
