 The fire broke out in the attic and the cause was thought to have possibly been from a short circuit in the electric wiring. Through the aid of volunteers a number of pieces of furniture was removed from the first floor. The Hagersville Fire Department made the twelve mile run in record time but were unable to do anything toward saving the dwelling by the time they arrived. The garage of Russell Hurst, located just east of the Peas dwelling was badly charred by the intense heat, but the building was saved.
 The Peas home was said to have been one of the oldest residences in Selkirk. Mr. Peas was in Windsor at the time of the fire.

Mark Senn's Agricultural Committee--Canada's Farm Folk
 The stimulating thing about the Agricultural Committee in the Progressive Conservative Caucus comes from two main points. The interest and knowledge of its members and the balance that they achieve in their representation of farm pursuits.
 Without placing undue emphasis upon the weakness of the caucus, it is a privilege to extend these congratulations to all their members and we join with all their friends in wishing they may be blessed with good health throughout the coming year.
 Their position, in the sense in which that comes from the standing that John Bracken holds in agriculture, is plain as follows:
 "Agriculture is our most important industry. Almost two-thirds of our whole population depend on farming for a living. When agriculture is prosperous, Canada is prosperous. When agriculture is high, any man or woman in Canada can get a job. When agriculture is low, employment is through-out Canada is low."
 When John Bracken came to form his "team" in Parliament he had an easy task in selecting a chairman for the Agricultural Committee. Senn was the logical man for the post.
 Mr. Senn, big with a rock-hewn head, has represented Haldimand in Southern Ontario since he was first elected to Parliament in 1921.
 He was first made chairman of the party's agricultural committee in 1928 and has occupied that position ever since.
 While critical in debate, and dogged in his search for information regarding the study of agriculture estimates, he is characterized by his essential kindness and his tolerance of most things except wrong and anything critical of his and others' loyalty to the British connection.

GROWS 124 BUSHELS OF CORN PER ACRE!
 Dutton, Ont. (Special)—An outstanding corn yield of 124 bushels per acre grown on a selected 5-acre contest plot, has won the 1946 Canadian corn growing championship for Jack Witherden, Elgin County farmer, in the 8th Annual DeKalb Corn Growing Contest. He is pictured above (right) with his father Ernest Witherden.
 Witherden's yield was accurately computed according to contest rules from a selected 5-acre plot that had been in corn the year before. The contest field was sown, plowed, disked and harrowed, and 100 pounds per acre of fertilizer was applied. On May 10 DeKalb hybrid seed corn, variety 250 and 65 were planted in drill rows 40 inches apart.
 Witherden won over a field of 97 Canadian contestants whose yield averaged 85.5 bushels per acre on their selected 5-acre contest plots.

Death Divides 71 Year Marriage
 Simcoe, Feb. 17 - Death has separated one of the longest-married couples in Ontario. The passing of Mrs. E. R. Cockerill, 71, on Saturday at Elton Hoover, one-time blacksmith, at the age of 71, has divided a 71-year marriage. His wife, ninety-five, survives him. They were married at Victoria, November 23rd, 1875, and celebrated their Seventy-first anniversary three months ago.

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Bruce French Dies Suddenly

 Toronto, Feb. 19 - (CP) - Two divergent views on 1947 wage demands were offered to the Ontario Federation of Labor on C.I.O. annual convention this week.
 C. H. Millard, Canadian director, United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America (C.I.O.), said his group favored return of high price control, instead of seeking an over-all wage increase.
 Disagreement came from C. S. Jackson, Canadian director, United Electrical Workers (C.I.O.), who attended as an observer. He stressed that wage boosts are more necessary now and asked labor 'not to drop demand for higher pay."
