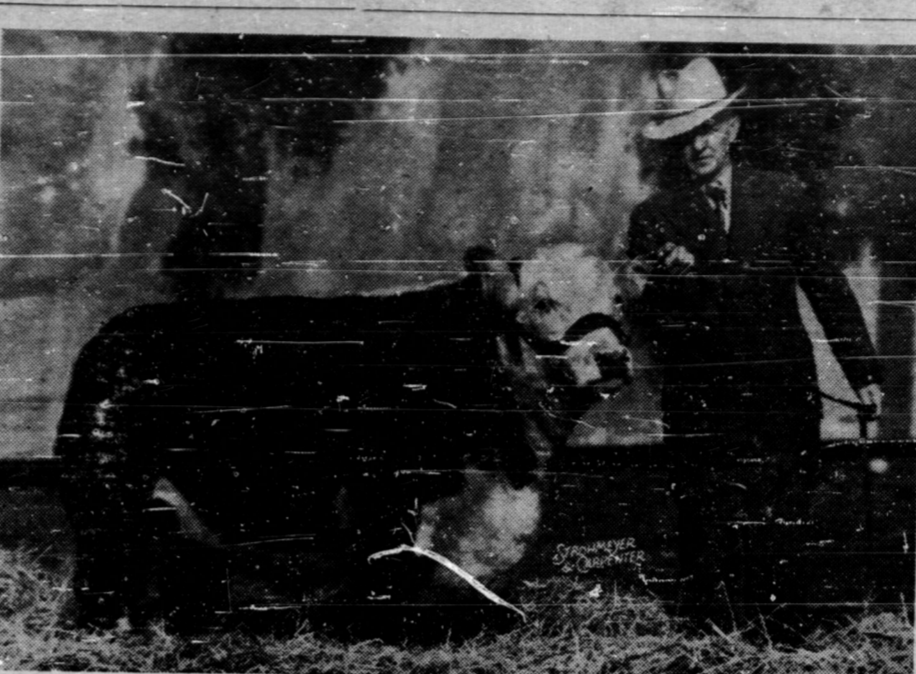

The Governor General of Canada and Lady Alexander might not have known that such a place as Jarvis existed before the Royal Winter Fair but when the T. Eaton Company bid thirteen dollars a pound for The Grand Champion Hereford Steer, owned by Fred W. and Glen Reicheld they no doubt thought Jarvis was quite a place. Never before in Canada and probably never on this continent, has the Grand Champion Steer of the show been crowned and auctioned under such a brilliant setting as was provided at the 1946 Royal Winter Fair. Besides The Governor-General and His Lady occupying the Vice-Regal Box were twelve thousand people from all parts of Canada. Judge Charles Yule of Calgary, Alberta, awarded the Grand Championship. This was followed by the auctioning of the animal by the well known auctioneer, Lorne E. Franklin, in dress clothes who took his place in the centre of the vast arena. From box and ringside came bids that mounted dollar by dollar until the record price of thirteen dollars a pound was reached and the Grand Champion steer, the son of the Reicheld herd sire, Peter Mischief, became the property of The T. Eaton Co., who donated the animal to Christie Street Hospital.

Junior Farmers from seven counties met at the Rural Youth Centre last week for a Leadership Training Conference as one of a series of meetings held across the Province. This was the largest held to date with over seventy delegates being registered.
