

Carbon Monoxide A Stealthy Killer

C

Beware of Caroon Monoxide! This gas which has caused thousands upon thousands of ac-cidental deaths does not appear in nature. It results almost en-thely from incomplete oxidation or the burning of material con-taining carbon.

It is present during electrical storms, when buildings burn up and after explosions and fires ia mines. It is also produced in lime, brick and charcoal kilns. In the laboratory it is produced by heating formic acid and oxalic acid with sulphuric acid. It is found in smoke and in rooms which have peen painted and sealed.

Carbon monoxide is particu-larly dangerous because it has no smell. It is colorless and should not be confused with carbon dioxide gas which is expelled from the lungs in breathing.
