Britain Imports European Labor For Production


To be or not to be is no longer the question in Canada with regard to mmigration. In a modest way, perhaps, it is already under way, with hundreds of Poles and 1,000 Dutch here, 7,000 Britons coming. All that still seems to be open to question is how many of the Old World's anxious, all told, are to be permitted to come, and how soon, asks the

Sault Daily Star. At such a time, it is of interest to note what the "slow" British are doing. According to the British information Services in New York, the number of European displaced per-sons being admitted to the United Kingdom has risen from 1,000 to 4,000 weekly.

For the last decade Britain has had a steadily growing refugee population. Before the war, Jewish refugees from Germany, Austria, Czechoslovakia and other countres swallowed by the Nazis came to Britain for safety by the thousands Last winter, accentuation of Britain's critical manpower shortage resulted in the decesion to recruit displaced persons from Europe. More than 10,000 skilled workers from the D.P. camps of Germany already are settling down to new jobs and new lives in such United Kingdom industrial centres as Manchester, Birmingham, London, Newcastle and so on.

Britain is now estimated to number 450,000 recent immigrants among its population. But it is planned to draw still further on what is now the greatest potential manpower pool in the world.
