THE NATURAL GAS SITUATION

THERE ARE MANY conflicting theories concerning what will have to be done this coming winter, by the natural gas consumers obtaining their supplies from The Dominion Natural Gas Co. From information we can obtain this is the situation:

There must be a reduction in the overall consumption of the product by the customers of the Company.

Those in a position to convert to other types of fuel must do so for heating purposes.

Favourable consideration will be given to those customers who have no other heating facilities. This would apply to homes where gas has been used since the early days of Natural Gas production in this area and where no chimneys are available for other heating. Favourable consideration will also be given to widows and elderly people who cannot conveniently tend to other types of fires. Anyone depending on gas entirely, either from the use of a non-converter type of furnace or the use of space heaters will have the favourable consideration of the committee of municipal representatives set up to study the applications of consumers.

It is important that each consumer who feels he is entitled to more than 5M. Cu. Ft. per month during the winter months file an appli-

cation with the local Dominion Gas Company Office immediately and not later than August 15th. These forms are now available and consumers would be well advised to go to the local Gas Office and complete this form.

There seems little doubt but that consumers in this area, where natural gas has been the main source of fuel for both cooking and heating over a long period of years, will be given priority on the supplies available. Nevertheless there is a shortage of gas and those who can possibly convert to other types of heating would be well advised to do so without delay. Those who simply cannot do this need not be unduly concerned because there is every indication their requirements will be made available to them.

WANTED — PEOPLE!
FEW MATTERS before Parliament have been so widely remarked upon by press and public as that of immigration into Canada. While economists disagree as to Canada's situation, the issue seems clear. Canada is a vast land. It occupies 1/3 of the land surface of the earth. But its population is small. It has just under 12 1/2 million people. Too much land plus too few people add up to one thing — the need for immigration.

Recent pronouncements by the Government have not committed it to any vast policy of plan, but steps are being made in the right direction. While economists disagree as to Canada's possible population, there is no doubt that its present population could be doubled, with good effect.

First step should be a thorough survey of every phase of the problem by chosen economists, financiers and industrialists. A Board of Managers or a Commission should then be appointed to determine and pursue, free of party politics, a long-term program bringing into Canada possibly five million persons within ten years.

There should be minimum restrictions, chief conditions of entry being a clean bill of health, physical and mental fitness, and the ability and willingness to work. There should be a preponderance of British immigrants, other nationals being admitted by quota.
