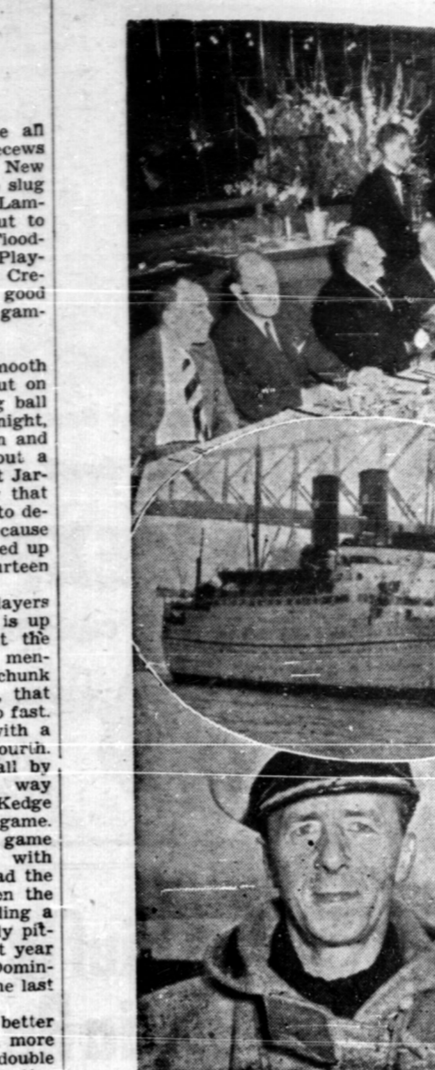

Toronto, August 6 (CP) - A new deal for carnival-loving kiddies — and adults, too — has been promised by Toronto's Mayor Robert Hood Saunders. Last week he threw a whit-bang at unscrupulous operators of fish ponds and "hoop game" concessions who the mayor claims have been brazenly rooking the bus too long.

It began when the mayor investigated complaints that an amusement centre's fish pond was pulling the old "hoop game". For a dime, Junior was given a rod with hook to be on the scene. The "big numbers" or prize fish were as rare as sperm whales in the Dead Sea.

Harold's mayor, after suspending the sharpshooter game: "If we are going to have these games in our parks they are going to be on the level. The public is going to get a square break or else the games must be closed."

No sooner had he called for a "square break" than squatters wouldnt' rit round hoops aroused his ire. He called for cancellation of a "hoop game" operator's licence at a district carnival because: Police told him they had visited the game and tried dropping wooden hoops over prizes set on square blocks. Supreme Court Action Follows Highway Crash

A Supreme Court writ has been issued on behalf of Merna Davis and James Bibby, both of Hamilton, against the Walmer Transport Company Limited, Hamilton; Thomas Pankhurst, Port Dover; and the Levy Auto Parts Limited, Toronto, for unpaid damages resulting from an accident which occurred on August 6, 1946, on Highway No. 6 near Jarvis, and which is alleged to have caused the death of the plaintiffs' wife, M.
