BIRD NOTES

A common bird seen flying about Jarvis these days is the Chimney Swift, which utters a series of twittering notes as it flits through the air. This bird has been described as a "cigar with wings". The peculiar nest of the Chimney Swift is a saucer of twigs cemented together with a salivary secretion and stuck to the wall of chimneys or dark buildings. In the evening or on cloudy days is the best time to see these birds as they move overhead on swift heating wings.
Purple Martins are sociable birds that prefer to live around the homes of man, and will eagerly accept nesting boxes put up for them. These birds also like their own company and dwell in colonies and some houses with over one hundred apartments are occupied by them. Around the nests these birds keep up a day long
