WAGES OUGHT TO BE HIGHER-

WAGES, REAL WAGES, have never been workers produced as efficiently as healthful effort would permit. Wages have always been too low because most people are allergic to the kind of work for which they are fitted. The great majority of people prefer idleness to work They are not sufficiently interested in acquiring the things other people are willing to earn ing the things other people are willing to earn

(may it never lag) and the too-much money they extort for too-little work, does not mean that we are opposed to higher wages. In fact, we favor the highest wages consistent with the wealth produced and the expansion of efficient, profitable industries. We are opposed, we nope unalterably to higher unreal wages, because wages which are not based on increased production per person are extracted from the

real wages of all other workers. Unless the electrical workers each produce more electrical goods per hour, any increase in their wages must be taken from farmers and others who must work more hours to get costreducing production equipment, and conveniences for their homes. More production per person by electrical workers and farmers increas-


