Temporary Committee Elected Formulate Plans for Teen-Agers Organization

A committee of five teen-agers was elected at the public meeting in the Town Hall on Monday night to draw up a plan of organization for the group which, if approved by the adult committee and the teen-agers shall become the official constitution of the organization. The teen-agers also gave unanimous approval of the constitution of the proposed organization by the Village Council. The meeting was highlighted by an address by Bert Richardson, director of the Jarvis Teen-Town organization. Mrs. Peter Henderson, convener of the temporary committee of adults, presided at the first meeting two weeks ago, reported on their activities. She pointed out that the committee had interviewed the Village Council and had been promised the free use of the Town Hall one night each week for teen-town activities. A suggested constitution had been drawn up for presentation at the meeting and that the committee had visited Paris the previous Saturday evening to see the Teen-Town there in action. Councilor Banks confirmed the stand of the Village Council in permitting the use of the Town Hall. Rev. W. H. Fuller presented the suggested constitution for the adult organization which was unanimously approved. The constitution calls for the committee to be appointed each year in the month of October by the Village Council. The Village Council, Athletic Association, Knox Presbyterian Church, Wesley United Church, St. Paul's Anglican Church, St. Ann's Roman Catholic Church, Women's Institute, the School Board and the Ministerial Association. This committee in consultation with the Director of the Teen-Agers organization; act as a liaison between the Teen-Town; have the power to advise the Director with respect to program activities and have power of approval over the constitution and all by-laws of Teen-Town. The Director of Teen-Town shall hold office by one year appointment in consultation with the program of the organization and give in writing to the Teen-Town Executive, frame the program of the organization and act as the first step in developing their own organization a temporary committee consisting of a Chairman, Secretary and three Directors were elected by the Teen-Agers on Monday night. Ken Bousfield was elected Chairman, Arlene Brand, Secretary and Dorothy Fleming, Deputy Secretary. This committee will draw up a plan of organization for the Teen-Town on Monday night. Addressing the group, Richardson asked for opinions regarding the age for membership in the Teen-Town Club. The opinion generally seemed to be fourteen years of age or anyone having reached High School standing. Richardson stated that the Teen-Town Council will immediately request nominations for membership in the Teen-Town on Monday night and Larry Lundy was acting secretary.

TEEN-TOWN OFFICIALS PATTERNED AFTER MUNICIPAL COUNCILS
Bert Richardson, Director of Teen-Town activities in Jarvis, Ontario, described in detail the organization of their group before a large group of local Teen-Agers and adults here on Monday night. Mr. Richardson said the new real opportunity to develop a Teen-Town in Jarvis in view of the lack of commercial entertainment enterprises. In Paris the Teen-Town executive is composed of a Mayor, Reeve, Deputy Reeve and three councillors, elected the same as their municipal governing body. Nominations and elections were held in a similar manner and said Mr. Richardson, "I regard this phase of social education of the youngsters. In addition the executive council appoints committees to take care of every teen activity. Each committee carries a definite responsibility and our experience has shown the teen-agers will be faithful to their trust. Voting privileges are accorded to members in their teens. As an immigrant, I was astonished to find that when I become a Canadian citizen my wife will be entitled to the monthly allowance committee of the Municipality of the Government on behalf of our son. I am by no means a rich man, but I consider that I am able to feed and clothe my family by my own efforts. There must be thousands of others who, like myself, dislike charity in any form, and this "compulsory" allowance seems to me to be just that. As far as I am concerned, the "Baby Bonus" is a gross waste of taxpayers' money which, without achieving its aim, runs into millions of dollars a year. What I would rather see would be a reduction of money to the expense of futile gratuities which are, in any case, at the debit of the community." DAVID BARNARD, 87 Yonge St., Toronto, Ontario.

BIRD NOTES

Of our common winter ducks found in inland lakes is the American Goldeneye. It is mainly white with a black back and a black green-glossed head. The distinguishing feature of this duck is a large round white spot between the bill and the eye. A whistling sound produced by this bird's wings in flight has earned for the bird the name of "Whistler".

Another typical winter duck is the American Merganser or "Sawbill". This duck resembles the goldeneye but its shape is more drawn out and it does not carry its neck as erect as the Goldeneye, and lacks the large round white spot between the bill and the eye. A whistling sound produced by this bird's wings in flight has earned for the bird the name of "Whistler".

One of our smallest wild ducks is the buffhead which again is mostly white with a black back and head. The head seems puffy, and larger than it should be for the size of the bird and there is a large white patch extending from the eye around the back of the head to the other eye which is a point of distinction in this species.

When these three species mentioned above are all found together it will be seen that the buffhead is the smallest, the Goldeneye holds its own erect, while the Merganser is largest and is drawn out over the water appearing "long-legged". A peculiarity for these birds in winter is along borders of ice in the open water of our great lakes.
