Inmates Run Prison Farm

Toronto, October 8 (CP) - A new type of "stay-in strike" is a new setting, led by a committee of 10 inmates, this week brought investigators on the double to Surbiton, Ontario, where they searched a plot that had been set up to escape of five prisoners last Wednesday.
