#### A NATIONAL DISGRACE-

WE ARE A PRODIGAL PEOPLE. Without turning a hair the Canadian people are compelled to admit that, last year, fire destroyed property in Canada amounting to nearly 50 million dollars, or about 55% more than the losses five short years ago. And, in the short space of 12 months, in 1946, 408 Canadians lost their lives through fire. Here, in stark fact, were 408 tragedies in Canadian homes. Yet, year by year, we continue, seemingly unper-turbed, along the path of destruction. Last year, for instance, out of 55,400 fires in the Dominion, 41,005, or nearly 80%, were in residential properties. Through carelessness, or wanton disregard of sensible precautions, fire destroyed, wholly, or in part, residential properties alone equivalent to what one would find in a

Organizations spend time and money preaching the gospel of fire prevention and illustrate how carelessness can destroy human lives and property. Regional insurance underwriters' associations of Board companies throughout Canada maintain rigid inspection services which undoubtedly help to prevent many fires. They also impress on the public that insurance rates are related to losses. Yet our fire losses continue to increase at an alarming rate — 1046 ching the gospel of fire prevention and illus-

The remedy, and there is one, lies in our own hands. We simply must pay more attention to simple rules established for our own protection. In other words, day by day, we must all exercise more care. some merit in this method. These tests indicate that the Premier Variety of strawberries is tolerant to 2-4- D and can be used to advantage where plant rows are reasonably free from grasses.

2-4-D is of no value in controlling members of the second properties.

2-4-D is of no value is controlling members of the grass family. There are a few other weeds, including some of the cockles, milkweed, mulein, ox-eye daisy, and toadflax which appear to be resistant to this weed killer. Most of the other common weeds, however, are more or less susceptible and it would appear that they can be controlled through the use of one or more applications. More complete information is necessary on this method and we do not suggest that growers use this chemical unless they are prepared to do so with a good deal of caution until some definite results are available. me definite results are available.
