A meeting of the Building Committee was held on October 2nd at the local office of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind in St. Catharines to discuss the furnishing of the new Niagara Peninsula Home and Centre for the Blind.

After considerable discussion it was unanimously approved that orders should be placed immediately for furniture in line with the suggestions submitted. The cost of furnishing one bedroom will be \$250.00. The total cost for furnishing and equipping the building will be in the neighbourhood of \$15,000.00.

The committee was pleased to learn that already a number of individuals and organizations have volunteered to finance the furnishing of a room. This interest and support is greatly appreciated.
