Who causes the majority of ac cidents - wild, reckless, drunken drivers? Not according to Arthur Rowan, in charge of the accident recording division of the Ontario Department of Highways, who explained that "motorists who consider themselves good drivers because they have never had an accident and assume they never will have one, contribute greatly to the volume of highway traffic accidents." Referring to interviews he had

had with hundreds of motorists involved in accidents, Mr. Rowan said that practically all considered themselves good drivers. They told him their accidents happened when they were driving in the ame manner as they had time and time again without mishap. But investigation proved they were not observing the rules of safe driving. Rather than "carelessne

Dogs and Cats Shun This Nicotine Spray

Ornamental plants on front porches, flowers and shrubs in the front garden, and the corner posts of porrhes may be protected from damage by dogs and cats

posts of por-hes may be protected trom damage by dogs and cats by the simple use of dilute nicotine spray. The spray is harmless but its smell is very offensive to cats and dogs, even when applied so thinly that persons are unaware of its presence.

The name of the material is nicotine sulplate and may be bought at any seed or drug store. The spray is prepared by mixing one-half teaspoon of the nicotine sulphate with one gallon of water. The spray evaporates and should be renewed after rain, otherwise in good weather spraying every two weeks is sufficient. Once they have smiffed the spray, the dogs will patronize the other side of the road in their favourite rambles round the town. Sprayed on small pieces of wood, the nicotine will prevent cats from making their nightly boudoirs among the rows of the prettiest flowers in the back-garden plots.
