This Week - -

Toronto, Sept. 3 - (CP) - Roaring with the eerie fury of 1,000 V2's, a tornado ripped a seventy-mile swath of demolition Saturday across Hamilton and Hastings Counties, bringing death to a twelve-year-old girl and injuring twenty-three persons.

At Coe Hill, the screaming wind whirled homes into splinters while at Gooderham five freight cars were rolled over like match boxes.

The 120-m.p.h. twister tore across

the two Villages with the sound of a dozen freight trains, and ninety seconds later disappeared — leaving totally wrecked home and buildings in its wake.

At Gooderham, three persons were injured, the roof torn off the Village station and the express shed demolished.

Provincial police and Red Cross workers raced to the area to provide shelter and food to stricken families. Citizens halted attempts to clear a way Coe Hill debris to observe a day of mourning for Myrna Ferguson whose skull was crushed by a flying timber from a wrecked farm house.

Reports from Clonyne, forty miles north of Tweed, indicated the twister ended near Madisaw Lake. A tourist resort operator in the same

district said a quarter-mile swath was cut in woods near his property.

Lying injured in a neighbor's farm house, Mrs. Harvey Neal was gravely stricken as she told how Myrna, her grand-daughter died:

"Myrna was in the kitchen helping me dry dishes. I looked out and saw the storm. I closed the doors and windows and saw the men (her husband and two sons) running to the house.

"The front door blew open. I rushed to shut it and that is the last I remember. When I recovered, I was lying face down on the ground and the door had left me.

"The floor itself had gone and I was trapped under a beam. My shoes were gone. We found the little girl under the wreckage."

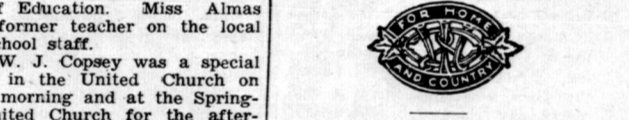
