

Q. How can I dissolve beeswax A. Mix a little ammonia with the beeswax and turpentine, and the wax will dissolve readily. Q. How can I clean silver

A. Silver slippers can be cleaned with very finely powdered alabaster. Take up some of the powder with a soft brush and rub until the surface becomes bright and clean. Then polish with another brush until the powder is removed and Q. How can I exterminate

cups water 3/4 cup sliced onions 1/2 cups celery, cut in small piece tablespoons flour 1/4 cup cold water

1/3 cup pickle relish cups hot cooked rice Cut lamb into 1 inch pieces. Season with salt, pepper and paprika. Brown in hot fat in heavy skillet. Add water, onion and celery (if you can get it!) Cover and simmer 1 hour, Mix curry powder and flour with cold water. Add to lamb, stirring until slightly thickened. Cook slowly 10 minutes. Stir in pickle relish. Serve on fluffy rice. Serves 6

Supper Casserole 1 pound sausages 1/4 cup diced green pepper cups cooked noodles 1/8 teaspoon nutmeg. teaspoons lemon juice cup grated cheese 1 cup apple sauce

Lightly brown sausages over slow heat.. Remove from pan. Cook diced green pepper in sausage fat until tender. Mix green pepper and hot, cooked noodles and place half in a 1-quart casserole. Place apple sauce, mixed with nutmeg and lemor juice, on top of noodles. Sprinkle remaining noodles. Place cooked sausages on top and sprinkle with remaining cheese. Bake in moderate (350 degree) oven 10 minutes.

In the present troublous times it is encouraging to note that, on the whole, Canadian farmers have many succumbed - to their later sorrow - after World War One. Only a comparative few have sought to extend their holdings, and no boom in farm land with speculative prices has developed.

As a result farmers are not nearly as over-extended as they were in 1919-1920. Instead they are investing in durable goods such as cars, trucks and implements; and with the extension of rural electrificatio ready markets for electrical appli ances of many kinds are found rural areas.


