ry VI and many others. Our guide showed his sense of dramatics as he told of the body of Charles the First being brought past planes with the chancel for burial at the death of night. For a long time it was doubted if it really was the body of the king and if he really was beheaded. Years later the body was exhumed and found to be the body of Charles the First and the head was separate from the body. We were fortunate in seeing the extensive and massive old altar vessels which are not usually on view, but had not been removed after a special service that morning. The lovers of fine architecture are richly rewarded for a visit to St. George's Chapel for although it is not an old masterpiece, the interior buildings it is far richer and the stone vaulting is glorious. It is going out on the north terrace of the castle a glorious view is obtainable over the countryside and in the foreground are the buildings of Eton and the famous Eton boys' school. In the town of Windsor at almost any time can be seen boys in their uniforms and topped with various groups of students. The following interesting item about Eton was clipped from a recent daily paper. A woman I know put her son down for Eton soon after he was born, 12 years ago. His name went on the general waiting list. This was a mistake. His mother should have made sure it was on a housemaster's list. So unless there is a change among the examinees in September, he stands no chance of going to Eton in the autumn. Hundreds more boys are waiting for such chance vacancies. Fees at Eton are now £78 a year. Nevertheless, lists are full. Only a half hour's bus ride from Windsor is Hampton Court Palace which I visited on another day. It is the most magnificent of palaces and was the richest and most powerful man in England. His household numbered 500 and 280 guest rooms were always ready for guests. Woolsey presented it to King Henry VIII who made it one of the most luxurious palaces in the kingdom. It is now preserved by the Ministry of Works as an ancient monument and historic building. Visitors may go through the various apartments which are full of period furniture, priceless paintings, tapestries, etc. The gardens at Hampton Court Palace are extensive and very beautiful, and the most widely known feature there is the famous Maze which was planted in the reign of William III. The hedges which line the paths of the Maze are six feet high

C. P. A. TO FLY PACIFIC
Canadian Pacific Air Lines has been granted permission for regular passenger and cargo flights on the two trans-Pacific routes shown in the above map, adding a total of 14,420 route miles to Canada's international air services. Now on order for the routes are pressurized four-engine Canadian aircraft, with a capacity of forty passengers and three tons of cargo, mail or express. They will be manned by experienced trans-ocean C.P.A. pilots - Canadian Pacific inaugurated wartime trans-Pacific service in 1940 and many of its pilots later flew four years of service with the Ferry Command and have since returned to the Company. Regular flights will probably start by next summer; it is felt that an early start is essential if the field of international air transport is to be developed and maintained.

BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER

Plenty of feed and water, good shade, gentle care and no flies for the cows are the things that go to make contented cows. The summer care of the herd is of great importance, not only from the standpoint of its effect on summer production, but also because of its effect on continued production in the fall. It is realized there are a number of one thing to do around the farm during the summer season but we need to remember ourselves that the cows are our factories and each one a source of profit.
Our cow factories are dependent upon us for the raw materials that go into milk production and like most workers respond when we add to their comfort. They thrive on general care, and make it possible for ourselves to see to it that plenty of good pasture is provided since it is one of the prime requisites for the season of the year. We should not neglect the question of providing an approved and adequate pasture program to meet the needs of our herd. Don't let your cows go hungry. Provide the feed, feed the cows and they will do the rest.
