SINGLETON RETIRES FROM

he Department of Agricuity Franklin Singleton, C.B.E., Asso ciate Director, Marketing Service and Head of the Dairy Products Di vision. He had been with the partment since January, 1914. From 1903 to 1906 he was Proving cial Cheese Instructor in the counties of Leeds, Lanark, Carleton, Ren frew and Pontiac. From 1905 to 1911 he was engaged during the winter months in instructing students at the Eastern Dairy School, Kingston, Ontario, in milk testing; while during the winters of 1912 and 1913, he gave instruction in butter making at he same school.

In January, 1914, he was appointed Chief Inspector of Dairy Products in the Dairy and Cold Storage Bran-ch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, continuing in this posi-tion until June, 1920, when he be-came Chief, Markets Division of the Dairy Branch. In March, 1932, he was made Associate Director, Marketing Service, Dairy Products Divis-

He has been Chairman of the Dairy Products Board since it was establish ed early in the war years to implement contracts for dairy products en tered into with the United Kingdom. In July, 1946, Mr. Singleton was made a Commander of the Most Ex-cellent Order of the British Empire, Civil Division, and in February, 1947. 

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

We Print Letterheads THIS WEEK tuberculosis patients has been announced by Health Minister Russell Kelley. The Ontario government increased by \$500 the grant for each new hospital bed devoted to the care of tuberculosis patients. This rais es the grant for each bed in chronic or convalescent hospitals from \$2,000 to \$2500. Present plans call for 400 new beds which will supplement the 3,600 now available. One of the first sahitoria to take advantage of the increased grant is the institution in Ottawa where a wing will be built to accommodate 130 beds.

Mr. Kelley said the incidence of TB in the province has increased.

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
