On the Farm Front
BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER
— By Haldimand Henry —
(intended for last issue)
Haldimand County has a heavy poultry population, in fact one of the heaviest such populations in the province. At the same time there is no organization which at the moment represents the industry or which can speak for it. With this thought in mind a group of producers along with representatives of the other branches of the industry will meet at the Rural Youth Centre on Thursday evening of this week for the purpose of discussing the possibility of having a county organization of some kind.

It is expected that Mr. A. F. Curran of the Dominion Department of Agriculture and Mr. C. F. Luckham will be present to speak on various phases of the industry, including price markets, feed outlook and marketing under present day conditions. In addition, Mr. Luckham, who is the secretary of the Ontario Poultry Industries Committee will say something about the work of that organization and the aid which may be expected from a similar set-up in Haldimand.

Where hay is plentiful much can be done to relieve the shortage of feed grain by feeding more of this roughage. This will apply in dairy herds as well as in the case of other classes of grain and hay eating animals. It is not suggested that the milking herd can get along without grain and concentrates but that dry cows and the growing heifers can be well maintained on good quality hay with small amounts of grain. Remember the hay must be of good quality. It might be wise to try feeding two kinds of hay. Cattle like a change of roughage as well as a variety of other feeds.

At the risk of labouring the subject it is again suggested that the conservation of feed grain is to eliminate the loss produced by the use of poor quality roughage. This requires records and we say again that the farmer who does not inventory his roughage and test the milk from each of his cows is not in any position to know what their cows are doing for him. Almost invariably there is waste in the herds where no records are kept. There is no room for the boarder cow, hen or hog on our farms these days.

A fact too often overlooked is that pigs give a little extra care will make better gains than those allowed to fatten. For instance a pig will appreciate good sleeping quarters and furthermore if a dry feed free from drafts is properly arranged the pig will keep it that way. The pig, in reality is a clean and tidy animal if permitted to be so. The fact remains that dry quarters crowded with pigs are not conducive to making good gains.

FLASH — It has just been announced that the total number of hogs inspected plants during 1947 stands at 22,201. Of this number, 10,787 carcasses were in the top grade. This was a 46.40 per cent and as far as can

STATISTICAL INFORMATION IMPORTANT TO FARMERS
During the last week of November thousands of farmers throughout Canada will receive Live Stock and Poultry Survey forms with a request to fill in the information concerning the live-stock operations on their own farms. The Agricultural Bureau of the Dominion Department of Statistics in co-operation with the Bureau of Statistics in the United Kingdom are conducting a survey of the live-stock industry in Canada and the United Kingdom. This is the first time that a representative sample of the live-stock industry has been obtained for each of the provinces. From this sample it is possible to estimate the changes in numbers from the year previous. This year the Bureau is introducing a new type of form which will be easier for the farmer to fill out.

The information obtained from the survey is used extensively throughout the world. The World Food and Agricultural Organization depends upon the Bureau to supply up-to-date figures on Canada's agricultural industry. The Bureau is also the official source of statistical information which is used by governments, farm organizations and industry to plan future operations in the farmer's own interest that a true picture of farm conditions be obtained and for this reason his operation is solicited to complete and return the forms as soon as possible. The information that farmers provide to the Bureau is kept strictly confidential. The farmer is protected by law against misuse of his returns and his individual forms is seen only by workers in the Dominion and Provincial agricultural statistical offices.
