## Jarvis Council Returned To Office By Acclamation

Like the Township nomination in the afternoon, the Village of Jarvis nomination on Monday night was a quiet affair with nothing but bouquets being handed out to the retiring council and School Trustees. There were seven names submitted in the Council nominations to fill the four seats and six names to replace the three retiring members of the School Board. Reeve Geo. W. Walker was the only nominee for the Reeve.

Nominated for Council were: David Banks, J. G. Paterson, N. L. Marshall and Chas. Butts, (all members of the 1947 council) Robt. Lynch, Norman Colbert and Stanley Mitchell. The latter three names in addressing the meeting after nominations closed stated they would not be contenders for municipal office. The 1947 council will therefore remain intact for 1948.

Nominated for school trustees were: J. W. Ferguson, George Keeler (member of the Board last year), John A. L. Miller. At nine o'clock on Tuesday night only three of the six nominees had filed qualification papers and there will therefore be no election for school trustees. The three who qualified were: J. W. Ferguson, George Keeler and R. J. More. The retiring 1947 Council reported on their administration to the complete satisfaction of the meeting and no criticism of their work was offered. As a matter of fact several bouquets were handed out for the difficult task of carrying on Village business in the face of present dearth of materials and labor. Reeve Walker gave a resume of County affairs the highlight of which was the announcement that the County would be entirely free of debt by the end of 1948.

**BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER**

What became of all the poultry that seemed to be a drug on the market earlier this fall? Latest reports are to the effect that little if any poultry is now being offered in spite of good prices. The turkey situation too is much improved and it would seem that the only grades left are heavy toms and these will likely be cleared out before long. This is just a case of history repeating itself. Surpluses have an unaccountable way of disappearing at times.

Because of this situation, farmers are well advised to "maintain an even keel" in the production of their various lines. There never has been much justification for jumping in and out and we believe this is one of those lines. In the long run, the farmer who makes money is the farmer who is steady in his production throughout the year.

There is still a great shortage of feed and present indications are that the carry-over at the end of the feed year, namely July 31st, will be the lowest for many years. This means that farmers will have to feed carefully and efficiently.
