The tremendous organization necessary behind the scenes in the operation of a railway train, was described recently by O. A. Trudeau, assistant passenger traffic manager, Canadian National Railways, Montreal.

"The operation of an average trans-continental train," said Mr. Trudeau, "represents an investment of \$1,275,000 in equipment alone. To maintain a daily service between Sydney and Vancouver, let alone these trains are needed five in each direction. The equipment used exceeds a cost of \$12,000,000. Each train requires a crew of 30 men to handle the passengers, mail, baggage and express."
