BRIEF NOTES FOR THE FARMER

Thirty Haldimand boys completed a course in Woodworking at the Rural Youth Centre last week and more than twenty have already signed up for a course in metal craft to be held during the last week of January. Daily during the week consideration was given to the sharpening and fitting of tools around the farm. This included saws, both hand and power, chisels, planes and in fact most any tool that the farmer uses in the process of building and repairing on the farm. The balance of the week was spent on the framing of a rafters and the proper use of the steel square.

As the afternoon was devoted to the making of some practical and useful pieces of wooden equipment for the farm and to the practical use of the number of articles that were made in the short time available. Letting any grass grow under the feet and as a consequence led a delegation of members of the Port Dover Lions Club into town yesterday afternoon and within two hours had interviewed and was given the verbal support of twenty prospective members for the proposed Lions Club in Jarvis.

History has a habit of repeating itself and one of the things that the time to the farm stay in, is when everyone else is getting out.

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Lady White Was Native Of Jarvis

Lady White, wife of Sir Thomas White, and a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Ellis Silverthorne, of Jarvis, died on Sunday after a prolonged illness, in the Private Patients Pavilion of the Toronto General Hospital. Lady White was Jarvis when a young girl and graduated from Alma College, St. Thomas. In 1890 she was married to Sir Thomas White, who in 1911 became Finance Minister in the Dominion Government which post he held throughout the years of the first Great War. During that period Lady White became identified with many patriotic organizations, including the Canadian Red Cross Society, and was the originator of the Princess Patricia's Fund.

Besides her husband, she is survived by a sister, Mrs. Grant Gault, and a brother, James Silverthorne, of Toronto.
