"SCANDALOUS"

SCENE: Bow Street Court, 43-48.
Metal Vents Ltd. is being prosecuted for failing to fill in Form 48 requiring 586 answers, for the Board of Trade.

A FREE PRESS

HECTOR MCNEILL, one of the brightest and most attractive of the present British Cabinet Ministers, represented Britain at the Geneva international Conference on Freedom of Information. He made a statement worth recording in letters of gold. "The British people regard restrictive press processes as Fascist, the abominable and vicious process by which a Government constitutes itself at once the author, the censor, the publisher, the prosecutor, the judge and jury. The free expression of conflicting views is the life-blood of British journalism. When the Daily Mail goes wrong it is corrected by the Daily Herald. When the Daily Herald goes wrong — or right — it is corrected by the Daily Worker. But who corrects Pravda?"

This is a splendid statement. It is one of the finest defenses of a free press which has ever been offered. There is nothing to fear from a Socialist or any other kind of Govern-

ment, as long as the rulers of Britain feel this way about freedom of speech.

Unfortunately, the rulers of Britain do not always seem to feel this way. The Government of which Mr. McNeil is a leading member has set up for the particular purpose of satisfying the demands of a group of left wing Socialists who felt that the Government ought to do something to control, if not punish, the British newspapers which are opposed to Socialism.

One British newspaper man makes the reasonable suggestion that this Royal Commission should now call Mr. McNeil as its final witness and then adjourn, and stop wasting the public money on plans for Government interference with the liberty of the press.

LESS BUSINESS MEANS MORE STAFF

WHEN THERE IS LESS business in a government office — the government even things up by employing more people in that office. That would appear to be the inescapable conclusion to be drawn from figures given by R. E. Drope, P.C. Member for Northumberland, on P. 1873 of Hansard.

Mr. Drope obtained information about the Belleville tax office and found that in 1945 a total of 64 employees collected \$10,680,000 taxes. In 1947 there were 82 employees and collections were down to \$9,000,000. In 1948 there were 77 employees and collections were a little over \$10,000,000. This year — 1948 — there were 121 employees.

"My experience in business has been that when your dollar volume of sales goes down you must curtail expenses somewhere else," Mr. Drope said. "If this is a fair example of other offices throughout the land, if they have all doubled their staffs in the past two or three years, we can understand why taxes are not being reduced."

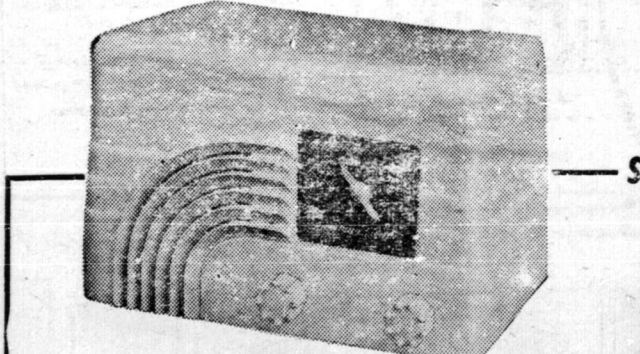

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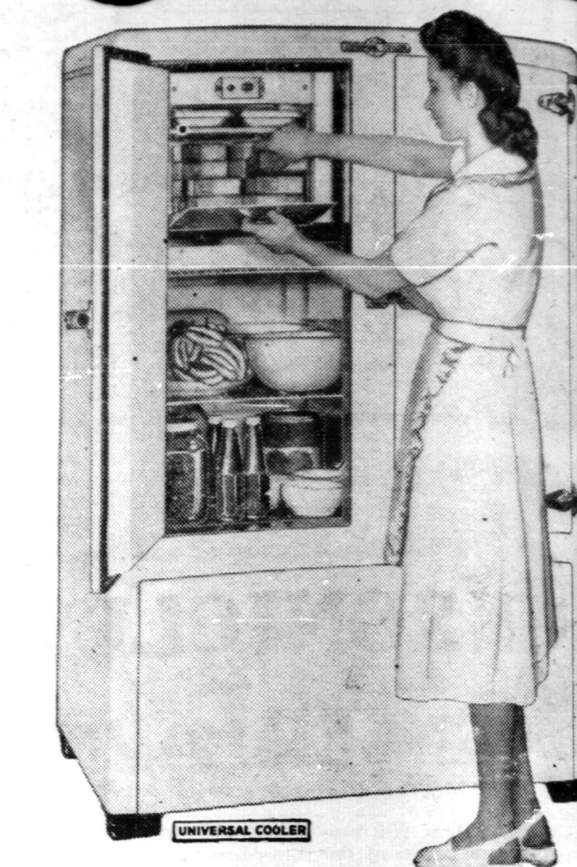

During 1947 the American Bible Society met the greatest demand for Bibles of all the years of its history. It is both surprising and gratifying to learn that almost the heaviest demand has come from directions where we would least expect it, from Germany and Russia and Japan.

Since 1941 the Society's publication for 1945, to meet the demand, has been set at 4,992,091 copies and between V-J Day and the end of 1947 they have shipped to meet the actual demand from Japan 1,220,000; and from Russia 1,200,000 Japanese Bibles and over two million Testaments and Gospel parts. To keep pace with this growing trend the total appropriation for 1948, to meet the demand, has been set at 5,000,000 copies.

ON THE FARM FRONT

BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER

If you have young chickens and have not yet arranged for the tattooing of them, you are urged to do so at once in order to save yourself and the police authorities a lot of trouble should they be stolen. Keep in mind that poultry can not be identified in any other way than by tattoo marks.

Some lovely orange-red flowers are appearing along our roadsides and in some meadows and pastures. These "lovely" flowers actually are plants, a weed which is causing much damage to permanent pastures in rapidity and soon crowds out the grass and is becoming more and more of a pest.

Paint Brush is a shallow root perennial and susceptible to cultivation. Infested areas and pasture lands should be broken up and put under a short rotation of crops. In rough pastures the weeds will not be broken up, the weed can be destroyed by spraying with a chemical weed killer without permanent injury to the grass.

In connection with the control of weeds, a pamphlet recently issued by the Dominion Department of Agriculture is entitled "Simplifying 2-4-D." As stated in the first paragraph of the pamphlet, the object is to answer as simply and as completely as possible many inquiries received about 2-4-D. An effort is made to simplify the confusion surrounding the many brands available. Information is given on the time to apply, methods of applying and how much to apply. Copies of the pamphlet can be secured from your agricultural representative at Cayuga or by writing the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

Halldmand farmers will be interested in knowing that a Second Grandstand Day will be held on the farm of George Innis, Woodstock, on Wednesday, August 4th. A number from this County attended the programme held on the farm of Thos. Dent last year and many more will be anxious to attend the programme this year to see the modern hay making and weed spraying equipment in operation. It is expected that stackers, balers, loaders, hay cutting equipment, bale loaders, hay crushers and many other types of hay making and handling equipment will be at work.

Halldmand farmers marketed a total of 2,247 hogs through inspected plants during the month of May. Of this number 945 or 42.05 per cent were in the top grade. This was a reduction of almost 800 hogs from the same month a year ago, and a drop of over 2 per cent in the top grade. The highest percentage of the hogs marketed were in B 1 classification. The way to get hogs out of B 1 and into top grade is to make them at the proper weights and to make sure that they are not over-fat.

Recent investigations would seem to indicate that the difficulty in saving early cut hay is not so much a problem of weather as it is of the hay itself. Early cut hay dries with difficulty and spoils with ease and it would seem that it can take up sufficient water from ordinary humid air to make it spoil. The value of early cut hay has been demonstrated time and again and the best answer is to follow the example being set by a number of good farmers in putting the crop into the silo at this particular season of the year.
