PLAN TO FURTHER

Hydro will be extended to 30,000 new rural communities in Ontario during 1948, Hon. George Challies, Vice-Chairman of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission stated in Toronto to-day in announcing the approved addition of 3,458 new miles of rural lines to Hydro's expanding are rural lines to Hydro's expanding sy

Mr. Challies particularly emphasiz ed the present saving afforded rural consumers. "Due to the amalgamation of the districts and the adoption of a uniform rate for rural hydro, the annual saving to the rural consumers under the present consumption will amount to approximately one million and the consumption of the consumpti one million dollars, when compared with the rate in force before the Drew Government took office," stat ed Mr. Challies.

It is the intention of the Govern ent to spend, this year, \$10,800,000

to finance the "greatest single year extension of rural hydro lines in the history of the province." These projects are part of the over-all Government plan to bring rapid extension of rural hydro to the farmers of Ontario. By the end of 1947, more than 58,000 new consumers had been added in a four year. ers had been added, in a four year program planned by the Drew administration. With the additional 30, 000 new Consumers for 1948 approxi-mately 90,000 consumers will have been added in five years to the On-

tario hydro system.


