**Joe Owen Disposes Of Service Station - In Business 20 Years**

Joseph Owen, one of the community's best known citizens, retired from active business on Monday morning and plans to spend the remaining years of his life doing "just what he wants to do."

For the past twenty years Joe has operated the Service Station on the corner known as Joe's Motor Service which he leased from The Miller Oil Co. of Simcoe. He would be safe to say that during the entire twenty years Joe has never been late for work, and with the exception of a few weeks last fall, was never away from the business on account of illness. Clocks could be set by his regularity. Despite the close attention he gave his business, the former Joe has consistently retained an interest in race horses and in the past twenty year period has had more than one winner. Since 1933 he has had four entries in the three year old futurity stakes at the Canadian National Exhibition and out of the four he had two winners, one second and one fourth. Not a bad record. "Lee Hanover" first gave him fame back in 1933 by copying the price in three straight weeks. "Lionel Lee" repeated the performance in 1934 and 1935, and came second in 1934 and 1935. He is still interested in race horses.
