ON THE FARM FRONT

BRIEF NOTES FOR THE BUSY FARMER

(Intended for last week)

Those attending the various meetings held during Farmers' Week had the opportunity of hearing a wide variety of subjects discussed by some of the best known authorities in Canada. Much favourable comment has been expressed on the complete nature of the information that was given. It was noted that a number of farmers were present on Monday at the Stock Fair on Monday was the largest in the history of the organization.

Prof. R. G. Knox in discussing the food requirement situation for 1948 stressed the growing of those crops that would not only give a greater tonnage per acre but a greater tonnage of total digestible nutrients. Emphasis was also placed on better pasture mixtures and hay mixtures, and again the speaker stressed nutritional quantities as well as volume. Prof. Knox went on to suggest that there were many thousands of acres now in hay and pasture in Eastern Canada that could be made available for grain production if we would take advantage of the latest information on hay and pasture management. He went on to say that the acreage per animal could be cut in two by proper management.

To the poultryman the most startling information of the last week was that concerning the discovery of an outbreak of Newcastle Disease in Southwestern Ontario. This disease which is due to a virus, is capable of causing a death rate of 100% in young chicks and the Health of Animals Branch is to be commended for taking such strict and immediate action to stamp out the disease. All poultrymen are warned to take all sanitary measures to prevent the disease from spreading. Quarantines must be maintained where established. All suspicious cases should immediately be reported to officers of the Health of Animals Branch. Visitors should be restricted unless authorized. Bar live poultry crates from the premises unless thoroughly cleaned and disinfected.
